Horrible Fratricide!

NEW YORK.
Pleased with Bismarck's declaration.

NEW YORK, 28.-A special from Paris, dated midnight 28th says the declaration of Bismarck that the northern states shall remain in the hands of the Germans gives great satisfaction to the communists. The gen d'armes in St. Louis are becoming numerous, and the loyal national guards, there have been organized.

The fighting at Bas Mendon continues. The battles of Montmarie are heavily fortified.

The Erie R. R. Co. gave orders yesterday to have all unused locomotives put in a condition to begin hauling coal on the first of next month. There is great rejoicing among the employees. Many of the engineers, conductors, firemen and brakemen have made only half-time during the suspension of coal hauling, and others have been idle.

New York, 9:40 a. m., 28. London 28.-In the Chamberlain, last night, Disraeli, notwithstanding the concessions of the government, made an unparagoned attack upon the budget. He said that government had been frankly abandoning its other proposals to save the tax of 100 millions on incomes had abandoned the dependence on indirect taxation. While he deprecated further imports on agriculture he equally deplored the leaving a tendency to increase year by year. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, in 1869, erred in giving up indirect taxes, and now sought to replace them by additions to direct taxation. The Chancellor of the Exchequer defended the reconstructed budget, and accepted the proposition of the consideration till Monday next.

The Versailles yesterday expelled the Communists from an important position in the village of Les Moulins, and occupied it.

There, in a speech, he said the country that the situation is painful. French blood is flowing but it is consoling that all are doing their duty, especially the army, which is completely unaffiliated and has now completed the investment and commenced active preparations. They are silenced and Moulins captured.

KEY WEST, 27.-The U. S. steamer Albatross has just arrived from Tahiti. The exploring expedition reports that a practicable route for a canal across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec has been found.

Fratricide.

CINCINNATI, 28.-The Gazette, this morning, in an article favoring the nomination of R. F. Wade for governor, says that while he doesn't desire that or any other office, we feel warranted in saying that if the convention met and nominate him he would not decline.

There was a fratricide near Akron, Ohio, yesterday. M. M. Kennedy, a farmer, aged sixty, was shot dead by his son, a young married man. There had been a standing quarrel between the father and son for some time, and yesterday the father went to the son's house to take away a horse belonging to him, and attacked the son, avowing his intention to kill him, whereupon the latter shot three balls through his father's head.

CALIFORNIA.
Dropped dead.

SAN FRANCISCO, 28.-S. W. Evans, from Southern California, dropped dead in a Chinese den last night. The Northern Pacific Railroad advertises for proposals for the construction of the line twenty-five miles of road in Washington Territory.

Rumors of Mrs. Fair's committing suicide are constantly being started. She is provided with every possible comfort in jail. Her daughter and her mother are allowed to remain with her.

FOREIGN NEWS.
FRANCE.

PARIS, 28.-The Mot D'Ordre alleges that Toulouse has insurrected and barricades are erected. Carbovois is bombarding Mallet and the Arc d' Triomphe. The Federals have established a battery on the road to Aviers, to bombard Genevilliers, Colombes and Courbevoie. The bombardment of the southern forts is feeble. The Versailles calibres is small. The combatants are increasing.

The Commune has forbidden regulations on the property of foreigners, or interference with the traffic of merchandise and management of railways. The commissariat is provisioned for a long period. A last delay of forty-eight hours is granted persons of thirty-nine and forty to join battalions, otherwise they will be court-martialed. The free masons have informed the Commune that they have exhausted their means of conciliation. The Versailles have resolved to plant batteries on the ramparts, and if they are struck the masons will march against the Versailles, and appeal to their brother masons for support.
