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A SAMPLE OF "LIBERAL" METHODS.

The executive policy pursued by the regular Republican delegation to the National Convention toward the representatives of the "Liberal" faction has been exhibited in these columns. The documents of the "Liberal" on the subject have been given publicly uniform. The regular news media was issued, the "Liberal" delegates was passed by a decree to see peace established. If this be a trick, it was performed in accordance with suggestions made by the writer of the article quoted, and the close to which he belongs.
