QUARTERLY CONFERENCE

LARGE TABERNACLE, Salt Lake City, July 5, 1879.

The Quarterly Conference of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion, convened at 10 a.m. Present on the stand: Amos M. Cannon and David O. Calder, of the Salt Lake Stake of Zion, Patriarch John Smith, John D. T. Meddler, President of the St. George Stake, Elias Smith and Edward Schneider of the Presidency of the High Priests' quorum, and the Presiding Bishop of the Church, Edward Hunter.

After the usual opening exercises, Pres. David O. Calder in a brief address urged the Saints to sustain the speakers during the Conference, and that they might speak under the power and influence of the Spirit of God. He explained that President Joseph H. Taylor was detained from the Stake on account of having met with an accident.

The roll was called. Of the seven Patriarchs residing in the Stake the Presiding Patriarch only was present.

All the wards of the Stake were represented by some of the presiding authorities excepting the 1st, 12th and 15th Wards of the city, and East Mill Creek and Big Cottonwood Wards of the county. Neither the Mountain Dell, Sandy, nor Pleasant Green branches were represented by their respective presidents.

Of the 45 presiding officers of Elders' Quorums, five only were present. None of the presiding officers of the Stake were present.

President Amos M. Cannon, addressing the conference, showing the importance of the priesthood being prompt and faithful in the discharge of their duties, especially referring to the young, and that those who were negligent should be dropped, that the callings of the Priesthood might be properly appreciated, and not trifled with.

The following names were read: A Statistical Report of the Stake of Zion for the quarter ending May 31, 1879, showing as follows: Apostles, 7; Counselors, 2; Seventies, 1,087; High Priests, 467; Elders, 1,610; Priests, 143; Teachers, 161; Deacons, 579; members, 10,315; total officers and members, 13,242; children under 8 years, 5,576; total of souls, 20,808; families, 4,079; marriages, 27; births, males, 31; females, 32; children, 63; members received, 203; members removed, 200; baptized, 67; excommunicated, 6; deaths, males, 51; females, 3; total, 54; individuals drawing support, 318.

A report of the 11th Quorum of Elders which was in all respects satisfactory.

Statistical—Teachers, 413; members, 1,912. Total officers and members, 2,325; children under 8 years, 73; women, 4,079; members received, 203; members removed, 200; baptized, 67; excommunicated, 6; deaths, males, 51; females, 3; total, 54; individuals drawing support, 318.

A communication from the Superintendents of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association, stating that the weekly meetings had been discontinued and the Association meetings were being held with Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement Association. Quite a number of the officers of the Association of the Stake had been called to go out into the field to labor as missionaries.
