

## DELAY IN PAVING

Such Action Advised by the Board of Public Works.

### FIRE PROOF PROPOSITION.

Intention to Sidewalk District No. 27 Defeated by a Majority Vote.

### THE USE OF CYCLES.

**Bicycles and Watermen's Committee—City Creek Park—Reorganization to Sidewalk Construction.**

The City Council met in regular session last night, President Leesborow in the chair. The councilmen in attendance were: Martin Hardy, Horn, Bell, Lewellen, Beardsley, Wanland, Hale, Simmsall, Kelly, Evans, Foulard, Morris—11.

Absent—Riley—1.

In the absence of CITY ATTORNEY Hoge, his assistant, Mr. Coad was present and acted as legal adviser.

After the usual preliminary business had been disposed of the consideration of pending matters was commenced.

### THE PROCEEDINGS.

Fritz K. Morris asked that an electric light be established at the intersection of Third and 8 streets. Committee on improvements.

H. S. Mathison and others asked that the Council annul the franchise granted to the West Side Rapid Transit Street Railway company.

J. Gedson sent in a bill for \$100 for services rendered as water agent in Parley's and Englewood canyons. Committee on claims.

The Board of Education asked that it be allowed to connect the Lincoln school premises with the sewer mains.

George Shepard and others asked that Plum street be put in a possible condition. Committee on streets.

J. W. Hale and others asked that the city furnish light in place of the illumination of Third West and 10th North streets. Committee on improvements.

E. T. Dury & Company and others asked that a bridge be appointed a specific bridge without pay. Committee on police.

R. E. McConaughy sent in a bill for \$100 for the breaking up of the legs of a valuable horse owned by him at the expense of the city. Committee on improvements. Committee on claims.

Elias Morris complained that his road to the lime quarries was being destroyed by contractor Hawkins and asked the city to inquire into and remedy the same. City engineer and attorney.

The Brigham Young Trust company sent in a communication in which it represented that the private property left by the late Brigham Young to his family had been sold and the proceeds sent to Mr. Leesborow. The claim was set forth that the lot had never been kept assessed and that under the general revenue act of the Territory it could not be taxed, and therefore the trustees asked that the collector be instructed to cancel the tax assessed. Referred to the city attorney.

The Pacific Paving company asked that the city pay per acre for the contracts for paving in 1891 and on State street this year be placed in city funds to be held by the treasurer, and the interest couplet delivered to them. Committee on claims.

Ryan and others asked that an electric light be placed at the intersection of State and First streets.

### STREETS AND SIDEWALKS.

City Recorder Stanton, secretary of the joint committee on city and county building, reported the following resolution passed by the committee on the 25th inst.: "That it be the sense of this committee and they recommend to the City Council that the sum of \$10,000 be paid to the third and fourth floors of the joint building, with the ceilings of said stories and roof trusses, be made free, providing the cost does not exceed \$10,000."

Considerable discussion followed and Morris moved that an expert be employed to investigate and see if these figures were correct, also to see if it could be done at less than \$10,000. The motion was carried.

Bell said if that was done perhaps it would be well to employ an expert, but his opinion was that this work had progressed so far that if anything was wrong the city would be obliged to come back on the contractor for the contract.

President Leesborow said the house was not fire proof. It was not necessary to have it. It could easily be replaced by another in case of a conflagration. The first and second stories were fire proof. The third and fourth stories were not. Admittedly so that in case of a fire if the third and fourth stories were made fire proof the rest of the house would be destroyed. He was in favor of making the roof fire proof, but other members of the committee were not. The bid of Contractor Horne was \$10,000. The two upper stories were \$10,000, and for fireproofing the roof \$5,000. He thought prompt action should be taken. He favored referring the matter to a select committee. Two members of the committee were in favor of fireproofing throughout, one was not.

Beardsley said he was certainly in favor of fireproofing the entire structure.

Mathison agreed with Beardsley. He wanted the roof to be as safe as the floor and the brick walls.

Wanland said immediate action was to be taken on the roof proposal, that it be put on the third and fourth stories were considered.

Kelly favored leaving the report just as it was for the present. He was in favor of getting a statement from the contractor before proceeding with the work of fireproofing the three upper stories.

Kelly said he was in favor of fireproofing but he thought it was a little singular that one man only should be

allowed to bid on the proposed improvement. If consecutive contractors were allowed to bid it might be that the work would be done much more expensively.

Bell, a member of the joint committee, said the city reserved the right to make some investigation as it saw fit.

Morris entered a motion asking what called for a committee of a special committee of three with instructions to report back to the council on Friday night.

Wanland said that that would not be the committee sufficient though, and he will therefore vote against the motion.

Karcher said if it were to any number of contractors go to the old one who was perfectly familiar with all of the details.

Gedson said he had heard it believed that somebody was going to make \$20,000 out of the deal. He was not a member of the committee but he had seen the bids a report to the council.

He had seen the bids and knew that the bidding was low, but that was because the market price. But that was not the business of the committee but that of the architect and engineer.

Wanland said he would not be satisfied with all possible bids.

Lewellen said that the earliest and greatest cost of materials was to be reckoned for the bidding of asphalt.

Morris opposed the board of public works making any other arrangements than those set forth in the specifications as stated by the architect.

Gedson said that the members who were eager for speed a few weeks ago were now having misgivings. He failed to understand why this was.

The report was held over until next meeting.

### THE USE OF CYCLES.

The city aldermen met in a room in which the bicycles and tricycles could not be allowed to run on the sidewalks. The proper place for them was on the streets. He quoted the opinions of Lewis and Indiana to the effect that the bicycle was to be blamed for the bidding of asphalt.

Lewellen said to come up with the ordinance on the same subject.

### WATER AND SEWER CONSTRUCTION.

The superintendent of sewers asked in a recommendation that an ordinance providing for making gas, water and sewer connections on streets proposed to be paved be passed. Section 2 of which would be as follows:

"All connections to any new street shall be installed at least thirty days by publication in some newspaper printed in the city or half block where the work of paving any street is begun, and the cost of such connection shall be charged to the property owner, and in case of non-payment neglect of service to be done in the same shall be done by the city and the cost thereof shall be assessed upon the property owner who can be found, and the parties refusing to make such connection to such as the Council shall as a board of equalization shall determine and equitably distribute and apportion."

Gedson said that the ordinance of the night watchman in the water department he was aware in as a special provision without pay.
