The document is a mayor's deed executed by M. von Darnitz, H. W. Wille on Sept. 2, 1872, nearly 32 years ago. It conveys to John G. Davis, for \$2.05, lots 6 and 7, block 61, plat C, located on the southwest corner of First North and Eighth West streets. Mr. Davis is still the owner of the property.

MINER MEETS DEATH.

Lee Sheehan, a laborer from Chicago, Killed at Highland Boy.

The chief of police received word this morning that a carpenter named Lee Sheehan, about 35 years of age, met with a fatal accident at the Highland Boy mine yesterday afternoon.

Sheehan was working on a scaffold, when he slipped and fell heavily to the ground and broke his back, causing almost instant death. The man's body was picked up, and last evening was sent to this city, where it is being prepared for shipment to Chicago, where he has relatives.

Nothing whatever is known about the unfortunate man's life before coming here to work. He had been employed at the Highland Boy for some time, and was regarded as a sober, hard-working man. It was reported that he had a brother-in-law in Chicago, but with this exception, the whereabouts of his relatives is unknown.

JUNE WEATHER.

What it Has Been Here for a Period of 30 Years.

The following data, covering a period of 30 years, have been compiled from the weather bureau records at Salt Lake City, Utah. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed during the month of June, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Temperature: 67 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1900, with an average of 74 deg. The coldest month was that of 1891, with an average of 62 deg. The latest date on which first killing frost occurred in autumn, Sept. 22. Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in autumn, Oct. 18. Average date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, April 23. The latest date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, June 18.

Precipitation (rain or melted snow).—Average for the month, 0.74 inch. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 4. The greatest monthly precipitation was 2.67 inches in 1885. The least monthly precipitation was .01 inch in 1880 and 1889. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 2.00 inches on June 24, 1885. The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours (record extending to winter of 1884-85 only) was trace, on June 3 and 4, 1888, and June 1, 1902.

Clouds and Weather.—Average number of clear days, 16; partly cloudy days, 11; cloudy days, 13.

Wind.—The prevailing winds have been from the northwest. The average highest velocity of the wind is 6.4. The highest velocity of the wind was 54 miles from the northwest on June 6, 1901.
