LOCAL BRIEFS.

Too Many Sight Seers—So many sight seers have been swarming in and out of the Newhouse building en masse on the main street that guards have been set there to keep people out.

Shurtliff Funeral—The funeral of Mrs. Mary E. Shurtliff will be held from the Eighth ward meetinghouse, Wednesday, commencing at 11 o'clock a. m. and ending at 2 o'clock, as previously announced.

Postoffice Improvements—The work of enlarging the registry department and remodeling the main room at the postoffice was completed last evening, when Acting Postmaster E. J. Keene, paid Contractor Dyer \$1,700 for his work.

Car Hits Farm Wagon—A car ran into a farm wagon last evening, at First West and Fourth North streets, and shoved it along the track for a rod before the car could be stopped. The horses were knocked down, but no further damage was done.

Flag Pole For Campus—The flag pole that was in the county jail yard, was removed yesterday afternoon, to the high school campus where it was put up today, at the east end of the parade ground. The flag will be raised tomorrow morning and lowered in the evening.

Charity Card Party—The Woman's Republican club met yesterday afternoon, with Mrs. Lewis who read a paper on "The Women of the Nation in Congress." It was decided to give a card party, May 23, at the residence of Mrs. Starley in aid of the Canyon Crest ranch.

Lecture at Y. M. C. A. Tonight—At the Y. M. C. A. this evening, Rev. Sumner will deliver a lecture illustrated with stereoscopic views, under the auspices of the Young People's Christian union. The lecture commences at 8 o'clock, and admission is free.

Appointed Interpreters—Sanford W. Hedrick, son of Chief Clerk Hedges of the surveyor general's office, has been appointed Japanese interpreter for the government at Fort Worth, Texas. Mr. Hedrick has been on a mission in Japan where he learned the language.

Will Release Logan Singers—Alfred L. Farrell, the well known basso, will leave for Logan, Thursday, where he will rehearse with a Logan company the bass parts for Burton's cantata "Hawatha," to be put on in that city next Monday by G. W. Thatcher, Jr., director of music at the Agricultural college.

Case of Smallpox—The first case of smallpox in the city for months developed yesterday in the American house where Steve Jones, a colored man, was taken ill with the disease. Dr. Benedict attended the man and he was placed under quarantine in his room. Jones came here recently from Fort Worth, Texas.

Lists of premiums of all kinds are being arranged, and various attractions secured. It is proposed to make of the 1907 event the banner fair in the history of the state.

Deserter Arrested—Last night Officer Kelly arrested A. R. Kelly, a deserter in Company B, Twenty-ninth regiment, U. S. regular troops, on the charge of being a deserter. He left his company about 14 months ago and was caught last night on Commercial street. He was taken to Fort Douglas and turned over to the authorities there.

He said, "We want peace, and it is encouraged by the willingness of the telephone people to meet with them to talk things over."

SALT LAKE IS HEADQUARTERS

For New Hydrographic District of
The United States Geologi-
cal Survey.

WITH E. C. LA RUE IN CHARGE.

District Office is to be Located in the
Brooks-Archie Building on
State Street.

Salt Lake City has recently been made the headquarters of a new hydrographic district of the United States geological survey. The area included in this district covers the states of Utah, Nevada and Idaho, and a liberal allotment has been made for the continuance of the work. The measurements of river-flow that have up to the present time been maintained in these three states have been carried on from three separate offices, one in each state, but in the reorganization of the work it was decided that greater economy of administration could be effected by the consolidation of the three offices into one. The new district will be designated as the Great Basin district, and Mr. E. C. LaRue, assistant engineer, United States geological survey, has been named in charge of the district and he is to be assisted by A. D. Williams, hydrographic aid, and by J. H. Smith, assistant engineer. The district office will be located in the Brooks-Archie building, on State street.

Tragic Death of Merrill Harrison Rogers in Colorado Last Week.

Merrill Harrison Rogers, chief engineer of the Denver & Transcontinental railroad, died from a stroke of apoplexy near Manitou, Colo., last week. He was alone when the end came and his dead body was found lying by the track by the engineer of a passing train.

The deceased was about 45 years of age, and was well known in railroad circles. He had been especially prominent in the Rio Grande system as an engineer of prominent ability. He is survived by his wife, who formerly was Miss Marie Dodge. The couple had two children but both died.
