

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The grasshoppers are to be looked after. Says an exchange, "A number of governors and others of the Western States which are subject to the grasshopper plague have memorialized Congress for the appointment of a scientific commission to investigate and report upon the best means of protecting those states from the pest, and also proposing that the signal service be instructed to observe and study the movements and peculiarities of the grasshopper, with a view to facilitating the objects of the memorialists."

—Here is a nice kettle of fish. — "At Clinton, Ill., there is considerable excitement over the discovery that the Hon. M. Donahue, the Hayes elector from that congressional district, is an Irishman, and has never taken out his naturalization papers. He refuses to make any explanation, neither denying nor affirming the fact, and says it is too late now to make any fuss about it, as he has cast his vote."

—Sankey lifts up his protesting voice against his revival hymns being arranged and used for waltzes and quadrilles.

—It is proposed to improve the color of some of the postage stamps in present use. The three cent stamp, it is said, will certainly be changed, as it is difficult now to cancel. An improved adhesive compound will be employed, so that when the stamp is once moistened and fixed on a letter, it cannot be removed.

—Senator Christiancy seems to be in ill luck. The Washington Star of Dec. 29 says, "Senator Christiancy was exceptionally unfortunate on his last journey to Washington. He was robbed while on a sleeping car somewhere west of Baltimore of \$300 in money, valuable papers, and his passage check. The thieves on presenting the latter were given his trunk at Baltimore, and the result was that he arrived in Washington penniless and wardrobeless except the suit of clothes which he wore. He at once replenished his exchequer by drawing his mileage and a month's pay, amounting in all to about \$600, and proceeded to his lodgings. That night he was again robbed, the thieves carrying away his pants in which was the \$600 he had drawn a few hours before. Thus he was robbed of nearly \$1,000, his trunk, valuable papers, and even his bifurcated garments 'between two days.'"

—A villain tried to drag a young lady into an alley, for his own purposes, at eight o'clock at night, on Twenty-second Street, between Pine and Olive, St. Louis. The girl screamed loudly, and the fellow became alarmed, released her, and ran away.

In Pennsylvania. — Elder A. M. Musser wrote from Strasburg, Lancaster Co., Pennsylvania, Dec. 30, that it was midwinter there and the sleighing fine, and that Elder O. F. Whitney and himself were well. Elder Musser enclosed a slip from the Lancaster Examiner and Express of the same date, of which the following is a portion—

"A MORMON SERMON AT STRASBURG.

"On Thursday, Elder A. M. Musser and Elder O. F. Whitney, of the Mormon Church at Salt Lake City, who are at present staying with us here, says a correspondent, held religious service in Massasoit Hall. Elder Musser preached a rather lengthy and very able sermon from the Scriptures, according to the Mormon view thereof, setting forth the similarities of their church with the church as described in the Scriptures, the foundation stone of which seems to be present Divine revelation unto man, a doctrine not admitted by theologians of the present day, generally. Elder Whitney also made a few remarks.

"After he closed, a Rev. Martin, a Presbyterian minister, and an entire stranger here, arose to combat the arguments of the Mormon Elders. During his remarks just a little 'Old Nick' crept out on both sides.

"The result of the transaction is that next Tuesday evening has been appointed for a discussion between the two Rev. gentlemen, when we may expect to hear Mormonism pretty well discussed. The discussion will commence at seven o'clock in Massasoit Hall."

—The New York Sun of Dec. 20 says, "The Victoria, from Glasgow, was riding out a heavy westerly gale about half way across the Atlantic, on the 18th inst., when, at 6 o'clock in the evening, the atmosphere improvised a rich display of phosphoric fireworks. Balls of glowing red fire, the size of a man's fist, danced upon the yards and stays, and as they fell exploded in mid air with a snapping report. They chiefly alighted upon the ends of yards, at intervals of a foot, though likewise favoring the centers, and at times the vessel had the aspect of being decorated for a first-class festival. One of the balls burst close to the nose of Mr. Theodore Knox, the chief officer, and for a moment blinded him. The noise was like that of a pistol discharge. No debris struck the deck and no smell was created. The balls were atmospheric and impalpable. They are generally forerunners of a gale."

He was for several years an active member of the 17th Ward of Salt Lake City, as a teacher, leader of the choir, major of the 3d regiment of the Nauvoo Legion. In 1869 he was called to move to this State of Zion, to assist in building up and strengthening the settlements in this valley. At the time of his death he was president of the teachers' quorum, superintendent of the Sunday school, corner of Bear Lake county, and was always found to be on hand to discharge any duty imposed upon him by the servants of God.—COM.
