

on Tuesday evening, May 3rd, 1881, Mayor Little presiding: M. Thorn, a partialty blind man, having a license to sell fruit, asked that he be allowed to use a wheel-barrow for the sale of fruit, and to locate it near Walker Brothers' corner, or elsewhere, where the city might see fit, under the direction of the police. Prayer of petitioner granted.

A petition was received from Elizabeth Ball, stating that she had purchased a piece of land from the city included in the government reservation, and asking to be refunded the price of the land and the cost of

Elbridge Tuft and P. T. Nystrom, petitioned for a license as liquor dealers for three months, from April 30, 1881, with the provise that the license fee be subject to future reduction and rebate, should reduction in the present fee by made by the Council hereafter. Granted.

H. Heilbronner petitioned for an auctioneer's license for twelve months from May 1st 1881, Granted.

A communication was received from E. M. Cast, stating that he had expended in labor on three dams, the amount of \$125. Received and referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

A communication was received from George M. Ottinger, chief of the fire department, calling the attention of the Council to the great benefit and efficiency that the telephone system would be to the firedepartment were instruments called into use. Ordered that two be taken, one to be used in the City Itall or fire department, and one at the 20th Ward fire department.

A petition was received from Louis

A petition was received from Louis Reggel asking the city to look after the ditch in the vicinity of his property in the Seventh Ward, which was doing considerable damage. Referred to the watermaster to be remedied.

A communication was received rom rof. A. C. Smyth, inviting the Council to attend the perform ance at the Theatre after their bors were finished. Received and courtesy acknowledged.

The trustees of the estate of the late Brigham Young, tendered the deeds for all new and unopened streets in the Eighteenth Ward for the consideration of \$1 each. There are three streets. The deeds were

are three streets. The deeds were accepted, and it was ordered that a proper record be made and the Mayor authorized to pay the fee of \$1 for each deed.

The committee on water works, to whom was referred the petition of W. T. Barbee and others, asking that the water mains be extended on Third East, between Second and Third South streets, on which they agreed to advance certain money, reported, recommending that the prayer thereof be granted, provided the petitioners advanced \$600, for which they will be reimbursed in water rates. Report received and recommendation adopted.

The same committee reported favorably in the petition of L. Reggel and others, and recommended that the Chief Engineer be authorized to

the Chief Engineer be authorized to purchase the necessary pipe and lay the mains from the corner of First West street, two blocks south and one-half block west, provided the petitioners advance the sum of \$1,-570, to be taken out in water rates.

Report accepted and recommenda-tion adopted.

The report of Alderman Pyper of the business in the Police Court for A pril was read, and ordered accepted and placed on file. The report shows the number of cases tried during the month to be seventy-six; cash fines, \$346. labor fines, \$379; total, \$725. The Marshals expense-accounts for the month of May were read and allowed, the amount being \$299.48.

The expense of the Fire Department for the month, \$130.56, was allowed. Mouthly bills for April were read and allowed as follows: To gas, 19:4.43; Janitor's bill for boarding \$9:4.43; Janitor's bill for boarding prisoners for May, \$223.86; to assistant watermaster's salary, \$385; to medical attendance on prisoners, etc., \$37.75; to John Aird, for services as janitor and assistant jailor, \$60; to dog tax collections, \$45; to Charles Burgess, nightwatching market block, \$8; to weighmaster's alary at Washington Square, \$18; to Abraham Gould, for coal, \$79.95; to Z. C. M. I. for maps, \$32.75; to draft of Thomas Wardell, \$1,750 interest, for six months, to May 1st, on corporation note.

The following appropriations to contingent funds were allowed: To count of supervisor of streets, \$1 000; to watermaster's account, \$500 to superintendent of waterworks \$500; to artesian well, \$6,000. Adjourned for one week.

BEAVER, April 29, 1881. Editor Deseret News:

Notwithstanding you have so ably discussed several points I intended to make on the ruling of the Suto make on the ruling of the Supreme Court in the Miles case, I think you have left points enough for me to redeem my promise to "call it up" and say all I wish to on the subject. It is no flattery to say I consider your arguments, as far ayou have gone, unanswerable and to the point. I was never able to see the propriety of the law of "triers" for jurors, and especially that their decision should be "final." The law is not only unjust, but requires what sectarians would term works of superioragation. It not only gives prejudiced courts an opportunity to strengthen unjust rulings, but is in itself worse than useless. I think the trying of challenging of jurors should be left to the court, with the right, if necessary, to appeal until it reaches the court of last resort. I concur in your view that the validity of the law should have been tested. There is no legal doubt, I think, as to its conflict with the law cited, known as the Poland Hill; whether it be sustained or not I think the Legislature will find it wise to repeal it.
