

### WHY T. F. RYAN RESIGNED AS RAILWAY DIRECTOR.

New York, Nov. 29 .- Thomas F. Ryan's announcement yesterhay that he had resigned as a director from all of the railroad and industrial corporations with which he had been associated, and that hereafter he would retain his official connection with only some of the financial and fiduciary institutions with which he is identified, while a surprise to inancial men was generally considered by them in line with the action of Jacob Schiff, of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., who took simi-lar action recently. Mr. Ryan, like Mr. Schiff, stated that his reasons for resigning were that his accumulating responsibilities rendered it impossible for him to properly discharage his obligations to the stockholders concerned. Mr. Ryan was a director in about 25 railroad and industrial con-cerns. The chief of these were the cerns. 
