LOCAL BRIEFS.

Caledonians to Dance.—The Salt Lake Caledonian club will give dances on the nights before Christmas and New Year's in Knights of Columbus hall.

Kindergarten Christmas Tree.—The annual Christmas tree celebration of the Free Kindergarten association will be given Dec. 17, a little earlier than usual that the University Training school teachers may attend.

Pres. Winder's Birthday.—In the notice in The News on Saturday of the birthday of President John R. Winder, a blurred impression made the date of his birth incorrect. The date was Dec. 11, 1821, making his age 88.

Mrs. Mudgett's Mother Dead.—Mrs. D. B. Mudgett of 935 Third avenue, has received word of the death of her mother, Mrs. John N. Squier of Jerseyville, Ill. The deceased had been a visitor in this city.

Ogden Appearance Postponed.—The appearance of the Salt Lake, presenting "The Serenade," at Ogden has been postponed until Wednesday evening. The excursion will therefore be run on the same day.

Set For Unlucky Day.—The preliminary hearing of Harvey Keats and C. L. Drum, charged with keeping a gambling house upstairs in the Cliff house, Main and Third South streets, will be held in police court, before Judge Bowman, Dec. 13.

Holiday Celebrations.—The first Presbyterian Sunday school will celebrate Christmas on Saturday evening before Christmas. The Third Presbyterian school will celebrate Christmas eve, and the Sunday evening after Christmas.

Ready For Reports.—The state insurance department has completed the work of sending out blanks to the insurance companies of the state for their annual reports. Each company will receive a blank and then file with the department an annual statement.

Veteran Laid to Rest.—The funeral of Henry Jordan, the oldest veteran of the Civil war in Utah, was held Sunday afternoon, from O'Donnell's undertaking parlors, under the auspices of the Catholic church, Rev. Rawlins, Wyo., the body arriving here Saturday. The interment was in the city cemetery by the Maxwell Post.

Bagley as a member of the board of education of the Granite school district was referred Saturday to County Commissioner John C. Mackey. D. W. RESTORE PENSIONS TO VETERANS

Lot Smith Company Men Re-instituted by Department.

REPEALS ITS FORMER RULING

Soldiers Protected Highway From Green River to Salt Lake In War Times.

Through a recent ruling of the pension department at Washington, D. C., the members of the Lot Smith company, who were mustered out of service during the Civil war, are restored to their full right on the pension list. The previous ruling which struck them from the list has been repealed by the present decision. All members of the company who apply will be restored to the rolls and receive a pension from the date of rejection.

The Lot Smith company was raised by Brigham Young at the request of President Abraham Lincoln. It did excellent service in protecting the property of the Telegraph and Overland Mail companies in 1862.

The company of cavalry was mustered into service in the regular army, April 30, 1862. The company had a full complement and was enlisted to serve 90 days or until relieved by a detachment from the regular army. The duty of the company was to patrol the territory and about Independence Rock. The company was mustered in following a number of Indian outbreaks that ended disastrously to the whites.

The officers of the company were: Lot Smith, captain; Joseph L. Rawlins, first lieutenant; J. Quincy Knowlton, second lieutenant; Richard H. Atwood, orderly sergeant; James M. Barlow, quartermaster sergeant; Samuel H. W. Riter, John P. Winnier, Howard O. Spencer, Moses Thurston, sergeants; Seymour B. Young, Newton Myrick, William A. Bringham, John Hoagland, Joseph H. Felt, John Neff, Andrew Bigler, Hyrum B. Clemons, corporals; Ira N. Hinckley, John Helm, farriers; Francis Platt, saddler; Solomon Hale, wagoner; Josiah Barley and Charles Evans, musicians. The company numbered 72 privates.

During their service the Lot Smith company was attached to Col. Collins' regiment of Gen. Craig's division, and were employed to guard the road from Green River to Salt Lake, with headquarters at Fort Bridger.

The company returned to Salt Lake Aug. 9, and was mustered out of service Aug. 14, 1862.

For their service the company and its officers received high commendation from the regular army officers and war department.

HIS CONSCIENCE SMOTE HIM.

Hans Rasmussen Returns Stolen Crucifix, but Paraphrase Betrays Him.

The fear of God struck the heart of Hans Rasmussen after he had stolen a cross and several candlesticks from the altar of St. Mary's cathedral, early Sunday morning, and the further he fled the deeper burned the crucifix, which he had hidden next to the bare flesh of his breast. His conscience lashed him about the snow-drifted highway, though he had stolen the things because he was starving, his soul conquered his stomach, and the pangs of repentance overcame the gnawing hunger. Finally he turned and ran like a madman back to the cathedral. He put back the stolen articles in their sacred places, and crushed him like a mighty burden was lifted from his shoulders.

But in taking the candlesticks, Rasmussen had rubbed the paraffin from the sides on to his coat sleeves. He did not notice this, so agitated was he, but Sergeant Robber, who was searching for the robber who had stolen the cross, did. Rasmussen was arrested just a few minutes after he had returned the cross and candlesticks to the altar, and while he was standing in front of the American house, on Commercial street, at 6.45 o'clock, Sunday morning.

But as the Master said unto her for whom the great cathedral was named, "Go, and sin no more," so said Dean Calladay of St. Mary's unto Hans Rasmussen. He must atone for his sin of desecration, but his punishment is with God, not with man, so we will not prosecute him," said the dean.
