LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—Last night the sensation drama of Above and Below was well played to an appreciative audience. It will be repeated this evening, followed by a series of vocal selections by the Rocky Mountain Vocalists. REFUSE TO PAY LICENSE.—The proprietors of the Salt Lake House, Messrs. Lawrence and Mann, are announced to appear before Alderman and ex-officio Justice of the Peace, Jeter Clinton, for refusing to pay either a hotel or liquor license. Such action on the part of those gentlemen, the proprietors of what has been considered one of the leading hotels of this city, requires no comment.

GO BACK.—We were glad to see Col. D. H. Buel back again. He returned from Buel, Nev., last night.

Three months ago, Messrs. Buel and Bateman purchased their claims at Buel, which is situated about five miles south of Tooele, railroad station, where they have erected smelting works, employing seventy-five hands, and have already produced 3,000 bars of bullion each weighing 100 pounds. Although the works and the mines are only half a mile apart, the former are in Nevada and the latter in Utah.

Several other companies are prospecting, and are meeting with encouraging indications. During the coming spring and summer, there will probably be a great increase of mining business in Utah. Such are the indications now, although it is to be hindered by the unfavorable course of certain parties, who seem to delight in making trouble for the community, and in unsettling the commercial and financial interests of the Territory.
