SUIT OVER MINE.

Montana Mining Company Asks Court For Restraining Order.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 7.—The Miner, in a special from Helena, says: Suit to secure a restraining order to prevent the Montana Mining com-to prevent the Montana Mining comto prevent the Montana Mining com-pany from extracting ore from the "Compromise strip" of the St. Louis claim, was begun in the federal court today by the St. Louis Mining and Mill-ing company, which only a few weeks ago, filed a third amended complaint to recover \$1,000,000 from the Montana company. Judge Hunt signed an or-der for the defendants to show cause Jan. 3, why the injunction should not be granted.

Jan. 9, why the injunction should use be granted. The complaint alleges there is a rich and valuable ore body on the "Com-promise strip" which is the only valu-able property the defendant has left in the country which could be seized if a verdict is rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the \$1,000,000 suit, and that the defendant is extracting the ore and disposing of its property with the in-tent to defraud its creditors.

WILL KEEP GOING.

Only An Ore Famine Can Stop Oper-

ation of Murray Smelter. Rumors were persistent on the streets yesterday afternoon that the big smelter of the American Smelting & Refining company at Murray was scheduled for a shut-down within the present month. At the offices of the company the report was denied, Gen-eral Manager Whitley making the statement that there would be no let-up unless the ore ran out.

statement that there would be no let-up unless the ore ran out. That there is a scarcity of lead ore in sight has not been detied by the smelter officials. The Utah lead mines have practically all ceased operation and the accumulated stock of lead ore at the smelter has been reduced very materially so much so that thirty days more run of the furnaces, even at greatly reduced capacity, will clean up about all the ore on hand. It was said by a well known pro-ducer today, who has his ore concen-trated to the American, that the man-agement of the latter has been urg-ing him to increase his shipments. He cut them down at the request of the smelter people some time ago; but now

smeller people some time ago; but now he says, he is in no hurry to go back to normal conditious again because of the low metal prices. "What's the use," said he when discussing the situation today, "If we did start up at full blast, we would get but little profit out of the ore shipped, so I think it is better to leave it in the mine than take it out. These low prices cannot always prevail. That's sure. If the smellers don't get the ore, there is bound to be a shortbree after 7@8. there is bound to be a shortness don't get the ore, there is bound to be a shortness after awhile. But I believe the metals are going higher-considerably higher-than they are now. Copper, lead and silver were all quoted higher yester-day, and if they improve, as I believe they will, it will not be many weeks

they will, it will not be many weeks until the mines can start up again and give employment to a whole lot of men who are out of work now."

Manager Charls W. Watts of the Seven Troughs Eclipse Mining com-pany, who has been in the city for the past week, received a letter from camp today conveying the very pleas. ing information that the north drift on the 150-foot level continues to look better all the time and that at a dis-tance of 60 feet in, a marked change has taken place. Several samples of ore from this drift have been assayed and the highest showed values of \$1,930 in gold to the ton; but this specimen was plcked from a rich streak, about an inch in width, fol-lowing the hanging wall. The east cross-cut, Mr. Watts stated, was in 32 feet at the beginning of the week and he figures that another 30 feet will take it through the foot wall and what is believed to be the hanging wall of another ore body. Mr. Watts expects to be in the city several days yet before returning to camp. There will be a meeting of the members of the syndicate which lo. cated the Eclipse ground, tomorrow.
