Sudbury, who is employed at the Empire Mill (Pres. Young's), City Creek kanyon. The sample of wheat shown us was so clear that it had the appearance of having been thoroughly washed. Before it went through the new smutter it was of the smuttiest and dirtiest description. Like other machines of the kind this one is composed of spikes and punctured sheet iron, but its superiority over all others is in the application of a principle, discovered by Brother Sudbury, by which all dust or smut is ejected from the smutter almost at the same instant it is detached from the grain. Mr. B. F. Cummings is the maker of the rst new machine, which is now in operation at the Empire Mill, where it can be seen by all who may be curious in such matters.
