

**Territorial Convention.**—The People's Territorial Convention assembled at the City Hall last evening at 6 o'clock. There was a full representation from all the counties of the Territory. A few minutes after the appointed hour the house was called to order by Col. John R. Winder, who nominated Hon. L. E. Harrington as temporary chairman. This gentleman was elected. R. V. Morris, Esq., was moved by Mr. C. A. Penrose, and carried that a committee of five be appointed to examine credentials. This committee was appointed by the president, as follows: C. W. Penrose, Jos. E. Taylor, W. H. Dusenberry, W. H. Maughan, A. K. Thurber. While the committee retired, appropriate speeches were made by Messrs. Milo Andrus and Anson Call. The committee then returned and submitted the following names of those eligible to seats in the convention:

The report of the committee was accepted and adopted, and on motion of A. Miner, the Convention proceeded to a permanent organization.

Hon. L. E. Harrington was chosen President; Mr. R. V. Morris and Mrs. E. B. Wells, Secretaries; Hon. A. O. Smoot and Moses Thatcher, Vice-Presidents; J. H. Smith, Sergeant-at-Arms; W. R. Smith, Chaplain.

The Chairman stated the object that had called the assembly together, and the Chaplain then opened by prayer.

Hon. Moses Thatcher, of Cache County, nominated for Delegate to Congress, Hon. Geo. Q. Cannon.

"He pledged for him the solid vote of Cache County, and expressed the conviction that throughout the whole Territory the vote at the coming election would be greater than at any previous time. Spoke in high terms of Mr. Cannon's ability and valuable services at the national Capital in behalf of the people of Utah, where, under all circumstances, he had proved himself to be a true friend to the people of this community, ever on the alert to further their best interests."

Mr. Cannon had retained his seat through repeatedly contested and for four consecutive sessions had served faithfully as Utah's delegate. He was a man who knew how to appreciate an honor conferred, and whose appearance, morality and integrity had shed a ray of purity over the corruption of an immoral age."

The nomination was seconded by Mr. John E. Booth, of Utah County.

"He alluded to the self-like condition of the Territories, with relation to the U. S. government. Our delegates had not the privilege of voting in the halls of Congress, therefore the next best thing was to send a man there who had the moral power to influence others to vote properly. Such a man was George Q. Cannon, and in behalf of the people of Utah County he could promise him their warm support."

Hon. C. W. Penrose, of Salt Lake County, heartily endorsed all that had been said on the character and abilities of the Delegate, and proposed, inasmuch as there appeared to be no other nominees, that the name of Mr. Cannon be voted upon by acclamation. The suggestion was acted upon, and Hon. Geo. Q. Cannon was sustained in nomination by the unanimous voice of the Convention.

Short speeches were made by Mr. Leiby of Tooele, Mr. Stanford of Weber, Mr. Cluff of Summit, Mr. Wunt of Iron, Mr. Smith of Davis and Mr. Miner of Salt Lake. The delegates pledged their counties to support the People's ticket, and made remarks eulogistic of the nomination. Mr. C. W. Penrose moved that the election of a Territorial Central Committee. Carried. A motion by Mr. Jos. E. Taylor also prevailed, that the old committee be sustained. Following is the Central Committee:

Mr. John E. Booth made a motion that the committee be instructed to draft resolutions for the People's Party. This motion was with drawn, however, upon another being introduced by Hon. Moses Thatcher, that the principle of the People's Party be, "The highest possible liberty to man and woman." The latter was adopted.

Mrs. Zina D. Young, in behalf of the women of Utah, expressed their complete satisfaction with the nomination made by the meeting. A motion by Mr. Whitehead was carried that the time for the meeting of Territorial Conventions be four weeks prior to the nomination of Territorial officers. On motion of Gen. R. T. Burton, a committee of five was appointed to notify Hon. George Q. Cannon of the action of the Convention in placing his name upon the People's ticket as candidate for Delegate to Congress. The President appointed the following named gentlemen as that committee: R. T. Burton, W. B. Preston, John E. Booth, Jos. Stanford and W. R. Smith. On motion of A. Miner, the committee was increased to seven, with the following as the additional names: Zina D. Young, and Emmeline B. Wells. The Convention adjourned sine die.

**Brutal Conduct.**—The following special was sent over the wires last night, received here at 8 p. m.: Payson, Oct. 7, 1880. Last night about 7 o'clock, an old gentleman named Peter Larsen, while watering, was struck by Fin Daily and son. After some words Mr. Daily told his son to knock him (Larsen) down, and as the boy was about to strike, Larsen seized a shovel and struck Daily on the hand. At this, Daily struck Larsen a severe blow with the shovel, dislocating his shoulder, and threw him into the ditch. He also sustained other injuries. Mrs. Larsen, on hearing a noise, went out with a lantern, and, at her interference, was struck several times by Daily. The trial comes off to-morrow.
