New York, Jan. 2.—The International Mercantile Marine company, organized by J. Pierpont Morgan, and with Cle-ment A. Griscom as its president and directing chief, took actual control Jan. 1 of the management of the various lines combined, says a Press dispatch from Philadethic

One of the first moves of public im-portance, Mr. Griscom says, will be a re-arrangement of sallings to give a fast passenger and mail steamship from both sides of the Atlantic each day except Sunday. It may take a little time before this daily service can be inaugurated. When it is it will be impor-tant to travelers and business men, as it will mean a regular foreign mail de-livery with no break.

Fire Loss for 1902.

New York, Jan. 2.—The fire loss of the United States and Canada for the year 1902 as compiled by the Journal of Commerce, amounted to \$149,260,850. This is gratifyingly less than the fig-ures for 1901 of \$164,347,450, and 1900 of \$163,362,250. During the entire year of 1902 there were 2,400 fires of a greater destructiveness, each, than \$1,000. destructiveness, each, than \$1,000.

Harper's Idea of Segregation.

Chicago, Jan. 2.-In the current issue of the University Record, President Harper, of the University of Chicago, defines his ideas of segregation. He says in part:

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"The policy proposes the continuation of the separation which has already taken place in chapel assembly with possibly an extension in the matter of division lectures. It permits co-instruc-tion in those courses offered to junior college students for which the registra-tion is not sufficiently large to warrant division on an economical basis. For example, at the present time one-third of all the courses offered to junior col-lege students, roughly speaking, will be offered to men, one-third to women, and one-third open to both women and men. "It would mean that as the members inc rease, the number of courses re-tained as co-instructional on grounds of economic necessities would be dimin-The policy proposes the continuation economic necessities would be dimin-ished. The plan makes necessary the provision of separate class rooms and laboratorles.
