The funeral of E. H. Buchanan, who was killed in the Martha Washington mine, will be held from S. D. Evans' undertaking parlor, Sunday at 2:30. Rev. Ellis Bishop will officiate.

The Standish & Simpson company has filed an amendment to its articles of incorporation, with the county clerk, changing the corporate name to the Brigham Coal and Lumber company.

The carriers' windows at the post office were changed today and the arrangement is permanent. Those who receive mail should learn the number of their carrier in order to save time and trouble.

Thomas Fitch is preparing to leave for the coast next week, and from there to Honolulu. A car load of his furniture is being packed to be sent to Hawaii. He expects to be gone about two years, and in that time to have helmed the globe.
