From your semi-weekly issue of the 26th I perceive that our new Judge for the Second Judicial Dis-Judge for the Second Judicial Dis-trict has fallen into our weak-mind-ed governor's error of doing as the lawyers told him. 1 hope this will not be an index to his future policy. Let us rather hope that this is an unintentional error in judgment and that his general course will be to mete out equal justice to all classes of our mixed population-a duty none too easy for a federal official to perform

I regret that his honor after ad mitting that there was a conflict of authorities as to the power of courts to mandamus governors, should have followed those whose views are the most detrimental to the rights of American citizens who, when there is a reasonabl doubt as to their rights, are legally, morally and religiously entitled to the benefit of it. This principle of law is the foundation of all civil government, and one especially guarded by our Federal Constitution. That he civil rights of the citizen may not be trammeled, a large margin of udicial discretion is left for the courts. When that discretion is used against the public weal to gratify private ambition, the safety of ociety is periled. The majority of udges are not always correct in their rulings, and if they were, there is often a dissimilarity of cases which are supposed to call forth the judgtyped edition of semi-barbarous

With regard to the powers and discretion of courts, especially in Territories, Judge Hawley went so far as to state in open court that leg-islatures in Territories were not rights but mere privileges; that the right of making as well as adminisring the laws belonged to the urts. This doctrine was subseently overruled by the U.S. Sa-eme Court which held that territorial legislatures have power to legislate upon "all rightful subjects of legislation."
