THE VOTERS OATH IN UTAH

The anti-polygamy law enacted at the shall, as a condition precedent to his right to register or vote at any election in said Territory," take a certain oath, which is set forth in section 24 of the act. In taking this oath the person who desires to vote is required to "state his full name, with his age, place of business; his status, whether

single or married; and, if married, the name of his lawful wife," and to swear-
