He based his expression and interest on the firm belief that the selection of any apostie would arouse a bitter feeling and do irretrievable injury to the best interests of Utah.

"President Roosevelt said: 'I am deeply interested in the future of Utah, in its material upbuilding, as well as the future interests of the Republican party. The election to the United States senate of an apostle would work great harm to the state. It would be very unwise. It would certainly lead to contentions and strife and bitterness here, if not in Utah, and would unquestionably be a misfortune to those who are interested in all that goes to make the State of Utah prosperous and great. I have every confidence in the wisdom of the majority members of the Utah Legislature, and I feel sure if they understand the gravity of the situation as it appears to me, and as I have heard it expressed by members of the senate, they will refrain from any action which will not result in good for the future of Utah and her people. I desire you to piace me on record as kindly, but firmly, advising against the election of any apostle to a United States senatorship.'

"Having said this much, and having as faithfully as possible conveyed to the Legislature and the people of Utah the position of President Roosevelt and others here upon this subject," said Senator Kearns in conclusion, "I feel that I have done all I have been requested to do by those in responsible position here in Washington and who have wished me to make known the situation, but I might add that Hon. C. E. Loose of Provo, recently elected to the senate of the Utah Legislature and one of Mr. Smoot's most intimate personal friends, had an interview with President Roosevelt on last Monday afternoon, and the president today stated to me that he has made this same statement to Mr. Loose with a view of having it conveyed to the caucus of the Republican members of the Utah Legislature."

SMOOT WILL NOT BACK DOWN AT THIS TIME.

While Mr. Smoot was evidently deeply concerned over the matter today, he did not care to discuss it in detail. In fact, he politely and firmly stated that he would not do so. It was understand that he was waiting for the return from Washington of Hon. C. E. Loose of Provo, who has been in Washington for some time, and who was expected home last night but who did not arrive on account of being on a delayed train. However, Mr. Smoot said this much, and the words were spoken with quiet and telling emphasis:

"ALL I HAVE TO SAY IS THAT I WILL BE AND AM A CANDI-DATE FOR THE UNITED STATES SENATE."
