uarters here is self explanatory: We note with regret that a demand is being made upon the Oregon Short Line railroad by the Utah Commercial club and the jobbers of Salt Lake City and Ogden to recede from recent tariffs favorable to Idaho, and clamoring for uch readjustment of tariffs as will give o Salt Lake and Ogden greater advantages over Idaho points, to enable those places to divert and enjoy the business which naturally belongs to this state. The commercial interests of Idaho have been for many years past dominated by the business interests of Salt Lake City and Ogden, to our great disadvantage, and the recent readjustment of the tariffs by the Oregon Short Line railroad was evidently made to correct to some extent the wrong which has been imposed upon us. We think these imposed upon us. We think these tariffs are not all that we are entitled o, but the concessions made are a step

n the right direction, and so far as made are equitable and just, and the time is ripe for the people of Idaho to stand for their rights, and to demand equal and exact justice from the railroads and other conflicting business interests, regardless of the selfish howl made by Salt Lake and Ogden jobbers. Southern Idaho is a territory be-longing exclusively to the Oregon Short Line Railroad company, and will undoubtedly remain so for many years to come. Every dollar of ma-terial wealth added to this territory. thereby developing its resources and varied interests, adds value to Oregon Short Line railroad interests and in-creases the demands upon its hauling capacity. Upon the contrary, any policy which discriminates against Idaho, or tends to retard its development, necessarily operates indirectly against the railroad interests,

The equitable adjustments of the tariffs is not a matter affecting jobbers only, but in our judgment is a matter affecting the whole people of southern Idaho. The consumers within this territory, for many years past, have paid tribute to Salt Lake City and Ogden as distributing points for Idaho, whereas justice and fair treatment demand that all merchandise for this territory should be shipped to some suitable point or points within the state for distribution upon as fair terms as those shipped to Salt Lake, Ogden, or any other place of no greater distance, or involving no heavier operating expense. The people of Idaho expect to make a fight to maintain their rights in this matter, if it becomes necessary, and the entire business interest of southern Idaho will unite in this fight, no against the railroad company, but but against Salt Lake City and Ogden, and if necessary will divert the entire ship-
