

DR. COOK ANSWERS ADMIRAL CHESTER

Says He Is the Unbiased Gentleman Who Was So Anxious to Pass Upon His Records.

DATA WILL BE READY NOV. 25.

Will be Sent to Copenhagen by Special Messenger—Will Submit It to Geographic Society on Conditions.

New York, Nov. 8.—Although he announced early tonight that he had retired to a quiet place "away from New York," Dr. Frederick A. Cook later caused to be answered to Admiral Chester of the National Geographic society, who questioned the Brooklyn explorer's claims, in an interview at Washington. Dr. Cook says:

"This is the unbiased gentleman who displayed such anxiety to pass upon my records, and who now desires to send to Copenhagen an unprejudiced verdict on the American people's belief that I have kept my promise to the scientists of Denmark."

"The only point raised by Admiral Chester is the suggestion of erroneous location by the midnight sun. This is a point of our position. Through the dark had been clear the northern sky had not been clear at night for many days previous to this. A low sun or cloud obscured the horizon and the sun sank into this. We did not see the sun at night for the observation. Nor did we see a star at night to which we refer."

"The original data which I will send to Copenhagen on Nov. 25, by a special messenger will be accompanied by an analysis which I am providing, and which I hope will make it unnecessary for me to attend before the University of Copenhagen to explain such questions as may arise upon the original record of my observations."

"My unaltered original field notes and my instruments, when I recover them, will of course, be available for examination by the National Geographic society upon the condition that Commander Peary agrees to submit his original data and instruments for examination at the University of Copenhagen."

Dr. Frederick A. Cook is at a quiet place away from New York preparing his north polar data, for submission, to the Copenhagen university. A statement issued tonight by his lawyers says:

"Dr. Cook's time was so invaded while in New York, and he was under such surveillance by persons seeking to interfere in his movements and those of his counsel and friends that he needed to continue the work upon the data for Copenhagen in a quiet place away from New York. When his work is done Dr. Cook will resume his activities in New York and elsewhere as usual."

It is denied that messages to and from Dr. Cook at his New York hotel were intercepted, but the statement says that the contents of messages sent to Dr. Cook in New York were published before they reached him."

STOP ON NEAR SIDE.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Following a conference and traction officials in the office of Chief of Police Steward yesterday, it was decided to have all street cars stop on the near side of cross intersections instead of the farther side, as was the rule. The new rule will be in effect until April 1, so that the public may become educated on the question. The traction officials believe that the rule will materially aid in removing traffic congestion in the downtown district by accelerating the movement of cars. At present the cars are required to stop on both sides of the street in the downtown district.

SAVE RESOURCES FROM MONOPOLISTS

Dr. Eliot Issues Statement Pointing Out the Danger, Which Is Declared to be Urgent.

COAL LANDS ARE GOING FAST

American People Urged to Bring the Attention of Their Representatives in Congress to the Matter.

New York, Nov. 8.—Dr. Charles W. Eliot, president of the National Conservation association, today issued a statement on the danger of monopolistic control of the sources of power in this country, which is declared to be urgent. The statement is made in the form of an appeal to the American people and deals particularly with the much-discussed question of the coal fields of Alaska. It says:

"The National Conservation association is convinced of the urgent need of immediate measures to prevent the control of the great sources of heat and mechanical power in the United States from being seized by monopolistic organizations and to secure the best development of these sources in the interest of the whole people. These sources are waterfalls and coal."

SITUATION DESCRIBED.

"The following statement describes the situation with respect to coal lands: 'The coal lands in the possession of the United States are being rapidly absorbed under the present inadequate laws. The fields of Alaska, estimated to contain 15 billion tons, shall remain in the heritage of the people. But had as is the general coal land law of the United States, that of Alaska is even worse, for there the government is absolutely limited to a charge of \$10 an acre, which is less than one-tenth of the real value of these coal lands.'

"There are already about 900 entries in the Alaska coal fields. It is true the field was recently withdrawn from entry, but the legality of that withdrawal has been questioned. Even if the 900 existing claims now coming to trial should be declared fraudulent, new claimants may file on the lands under the objectionable provisions of the existing laws without restriction against monopoly and waste, and without other necessary provisions."

"We have urged the present administration to postpone for the common good the trial of these claims, and we have no doubt, in view of the facts and of the policy of the administration, as declared by President Taft in his speech at Spokane, Sept. 23, that our request will be granted."

"There is a limit, however, beyond which such delay cannot go. Should Congress fail to act at the coming session, it is possible the opportunity to obtain adequate legislation for the coal lands still in possession of the United States will be lost."

"The situation with respect to water power development, both on the public domain and on navigable streams, is substantially similar to that with respect to coal. The water powers cannot be effectively developed in the public interest under the existing laws."

"We, therefore, appeal to the American people to bring the urgent needs of the situation to the attention of their representatives in Congress, in order that comprehensive legislation on the matter be enacted. To this end, every individual citizen is urged to do his duty."

FORCED TO MARRY.

BRIDE BETRAYS HUSBAND

Youngstown, Ohio, Nov. 8.—Following the arrest of Paquale Roman on a murder charge yesterday an hour after his marriage to Miss Elizabeth Andrews, it developed today that the bride had betrayed her husband to the police.

The man was taken from the railway station just as the young people were boarding a train for their future home near Cleveland. He was taken to jail on word from Brownsville, Pa., that he was wanted there under another name for a murder committed four years ago.

Today's developments show that the girl told the police that it was Roman who was wanted by the Pennsylvania courts, and that a reward of \$400 was on his head.

"I thought the girl was in terror of Roman's friends, who, she fears, may seek revenge on her."

"He forced me to marry him," she said. "He told me that he would kill me if I did not."

Immediately thereafter she employed attorneys to defend the man and declared her intention of remaining with him.

SEES WELL AT NIGHT

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—Medical experts are interested in the case of 19-year-old Aubrey Wilson of Nottingham county, who is totally blind in the day, but can see like a cat in the dark.

"The young man can see a bicycle when the night is so dark that ordinary people have to walk with caution, but in the day he grooves about, able only vaguely to distinguish any object and with no discrimination as to colors."

Because of his peculiar infirmity the young man is not as a common hunter. He can distinguish the animals in the trees in the dark as readily as a dog can follow the scent. All his life Wilson has suffered from this defect. He says it grows out of too much light entering the eye. It is called the "albino eye," he says.

BRITONS LOOKING TO ARGENTINA FOR BEEF

Washington, Nov. 8.—Britons are coming to look to America for their supply of "best beef of old England," and are turning more and more to Argentina for much of their beef. R. N. Bartlett, consul general at Buenos Aires, informed the department of commerce and labor today that the traffic in beef from Argentina to England was growing rapidly, and that the British Isles are becoming more and more dependent on the South American republic for their meat supplies. He also reported that prominent English shipowners and Argentine cattle raisers have organized a company which will undertake to ship supplies of chilled meat regularly each week from the river Platte to London and Manchester. "This trade," he is expected, will eventually cut heavily into this country's meat exports unless the matter is immediately taken up by the interested concerns.

That the new British-Argentine corporation is in earnest, is evidenced by the statement of Mr. Bartlett that work already has been begun on nine new 15-knot refrigerator steamers, which will be added to the fleet already at the company's disposal.

ANTI-SALOON CAMPAIGN PLANS FOR DENVER

Denver, Colo., Nov. 8.—The Colorado branch of the Anti-Saloon league yesterday announced plans for a campaign in this city which is looked upon as the supreme test of the feasibility of woman's suffrage. Efforts will be made to submit the question of making Denver totally dry to the voters next spring.

Thirty thousand votes will accomplish this result, according to E. E. McLaughlin, superintendent of the league, and he believes that with the cooperation of the women of the city, this total should be comparatively easy to go.

Speakers at the meeting yesterday when the program was laid out, declared that should the women fail of their support, the suffrage movement throughout the country would be given

a decided setback, and predicted that no other state would endorse woman's suffrage for the next 50 years.

George Hechler, president of the Liquor Dealers' association of Colorado, said that the saloon men had unlimited money to spend if necessary to defeat the league's plans.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 8.—The state board of health has issued a decree against the roller towel and the time-honored appendage to the country newspaper office and the country hotel will have to go in Kansas.

The roller towel is the most dangerous thing that the public comes in contact with, the Kansas health inspectors claim.

The inspectors say that infectious diseases are conveyed through the roller towels used in hotels, railway stations and office buildings.
