### SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

In addition to the delegates, the Saints generally are invited to attend all the meetings of the Convention and assist in making the occasion a success and one that will advance the Sunday school cause.

The Chicago-Prairie Herald has an interesting and instructive account of the way upon which the Cook county jail is managed by Jailer John L. Whiteman. The principle which he seeks to carry out in practice is this, that kindness is better than physical force, and to this end he claims that he has but one method known to him for proving the correctness of the theory. The proper treatment of offenders against the law is a subject of vast importance, and very light screen upon it should be

written. It is not improbable that public opinion some time will recognize the fact that some of methods pursued are opposite to those intended by all proper legislation, and then a demand will be made for a thorough study of the whole subject, and the appointment of trained managers of penitentiaries, just as proper training is demanded for other public institutions.

"Henry" has given over this prison charges, is but the beginning of a new era. That social and economic progress must not cease to increase the value of the services of the State, and that the men who have come under the eye of the law should not be thought of as bad, is a matter of common sense.
