## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

MR. DAVID EVANS, of Salt Lake City, there is a letter for you at this office, from Wrexham, England. Please call for it.

IN ENGLAND.—Elder James Quayle, of Logan, who was at the last October Conference called on a mission to the United States, but with permission to visit his relations in this country, arrived in Liverpool per steamship China, on Saturday, 17th instant, in excellent health and spirits. Elder Quayle left Ogden on the 2nd of last December, was detained a few days by the snow blockade on the U. P. R. R.; and has since been filling his mission in the States of Ohio and Pennsylvania. He will carry two or three weeks in England, visiting the Isle of Man, London, and other portions of the country, and then return to resume the duties of his mission in the States.—*Millennial Star*, Feb. 20.

SWISS AND ITALIAN MISSION.—The following is an extract from a letter which appears in the *Millennial Star* of February 20th, from Elder Edward Schoenfeld, now laboring in the Swiss and Italian mission:

"Elder Wilken has felt impressed on account of the indifference manifested in the City of Zurich to advertise our meeting. The notice appeared in a newspaper, once, when an order was sent to the printer from the president of the city,—one of the most intelligent of this republic,—requesting that this advertisement should not appear any more. But, notwithstanding this, meeting I am informed was filled with clergymen, members of the city government, religious old ladies and such like, to whom brother Wilken presented the law and the testimony in very clear terms. At the close of the meeting, the city attorney stepped up to brother Wilken, and asked him for some of our works, and offered his assistance if he chooses to proceed against the city authorities in the court of the Canton for unlawfully stopping our advertisement. Elder Wilken declined his offer, saying that he never would go to law against acknowledged authority, it was for them to show to what use they will put their power. On visiting the hostile president of the city, he said we had applied to the council of government for the Canon of Zurich to give us a hall meeting, at the same time hinting that this would perhaps be refused. Brother Wilken wrote to me; I answered, telling him not to be frightened, nor ask any such favor, because the Swiss laws provide that all depositions, professing Bible religion have the right to assemble for worship, and therefore to continue to hold meetings as before, but not to advertise, as they had forbidden it. If they wish to stop us preaching, they must first pass a law to that effect, and all Switzerland could stand that, we certainly could. We as a people can abide the laws of any country, there are not easily frightened."

"The Elders from Zion here are as united as a clover leaf. We are getting a pamphlet for the benefit of strangers, setting forth in plainness the principles of the Gospel of Jesus restored. We are tired of being misrepresented by the press, hence we take this means of publishing to the world the truths of our religion."

MEETING OF ELECTORS.—We have received the following report from Mr. W. H. Dusenberry, Provo, under date of the 12th inst.: A meeting of the electors of Utah County, convened in the Court House at 5 p.m. to-day, agreeable to public notice, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the coming election. Delegates were present from each precinct of the county.

The meeting was called to order by Judge G. W. Bean, who was chosen to preside, and W. H. Dusenberry was chosen Secretary.

The chair was authorized to appoint a committee of five on nominations. Messrs. A. Smoot, Wm. B. Brigham, Elijah Mayhew, John Woodhouse and Henry Snyder were appointed said committee.

Pending the absence of the committee, addresses were delivered by Mr. B. Miller, W. N. Dusenberry and James Clark. The Committee on Nominations reported the following names:

For Representatives in Congress, Frank Fuller, for Senators from Utah and Washington counties, L. B. Harrington and A. K. Thurber; for Representatives from Utah county, Wm. B. Pace, L. J. Nuttall and W. N. Dusenberry.

The names presented by the Committee were separately put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

The Secretary was instructed to forward a report of the proceedings to the DEERBERG EVENING NEWS and Daily Herald for publication.

The Convention then adjourned sine die.

EXPEDITION TO DEATH VALLEY.—An expedition started a few days ago for Death valley in search of the rich silver lodes discovered there, but which were abandoned on account of the dying of the stock accompanying the discoverers. The party is headed by Captain Frink, of San Bernardino, well known as the business manager of the Valley mine, at Wickenburg, a man of indomitable energy. Captain Frink has in his possession a diary kept by a member of the original party that discovered the ledge, on which is given a detailed description of the route thither. The diary was sent to him from Malibu for the special purpose of being used in finding traces of the old mine, the ore that was obtained from it being of fabulous richness. There is every reason to believe that the present expedition will succeed in the object.—*Los Angeles News* February 18th.
