East Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.
NEW YORK, 21.—It has been ascertained that Mr. Hall called at the city prison on Saturday morning to see a client, and told him that he would have his case adjourned over, as he (Hall) was about to leave the city and would be absent a week. Many believe Mr. Hall sailed for Europe on Saturday last.
Disappointment and Dispute.
The Times, in an editorial, says the conclusion yesterday reached by the President and his advisers in regard to the southern question will call forth loud expressions of disappointment and disgust. The writer argues that the measure will not satisfy the republicans who demand the recognition of Chamberlain and Packard, nor the democrats who demand the withdrawal of the troops. The commission implies delay, which both parties are impatient. Chamberlain and Packard have a presumptive title that no candid man, who acknowledges the title of Mayes to the presidency, could doubt.
The Colored Question and President Hayes.
WASHINGTON, 21.—A delegation of prominent colored men, consisting of Robert Purvis, of Philadelphia, Fred Douglass, John F. Cook, Dr. Charles B. Purvis, Charles H. Carter, and David Davis, of Illinois, called upon the President this afternoon, to tender their thanks for the appointment of Douglass as marshal of the district.
Purvis, in a brief address, explained the object of their visit, and said the appointment was gratifying to the colored people, because by it he not only recognized their claims, but gave a blow at the prejudice of caste, and they wished him success in his policy of reconciliation.
The President said, in appointing Douglass he considered the color of the country that it was his purpose to fully carry out the declaration in his inaugural. The amendments to the constitution must be strictly adhered to, and all citizens protected in their rights. He referred to the appointment of colored persons, and said no discrimination must be made on the basis of color. Should any public officer, having a position to be bestowed, make such discrimination, he would consider it sufficient cause for his removal. In conclusion he referred to his policy of reconciliation and expressed his confidence in its success.
The Louisiana Commission and South Carolina Affairs.
With the exception of Vice-President Wheeler, who is expected to head the Louisiana commission, only one invitation has been extended by the President, that being to Senator David Davis, of Illinois, who, it appears, is somewhat reluctant to accept the office, because of the attention required to be given by him just now to other matters. The President is reluctant to speak of the gentlemen who have been spoken of in connection with this mission but it is freely admitted that it is the wish of the government that he should accept a delegation second to none that has ever had in its keeping questions of such momentous interest. Upon the appointment of such a commission to examine into the condition of Louisiana, there is no room to doubt the absolute unanimity of the Cabinet. Up to this time little has been done in the Cabinet so far as South Carolina is concerned. Another session, which will be held either tomorrow or upon the day after, will undoubtedly finish this question, and it can also be taken as positive that the attitude of the President in South Carolina will not involve the sending of a commission to that State. After the determination of the South Carolina question the Cabinet will give attention to appointments of a prominence in cases where the commissions will soon expire.
South Carolina Matters.
Gen. M. C. Butler sent a dispatch to Wade Hampton, to-night, saying: "Everything looks blue. There seems to be a possibility of a compromise, but I am not sure. It looks like another game of 8 to 7. Hampton asked 'shall I come to Washington?' Butler replied 'No, stay where you are. You can do good here, and you cannot tell what a day may bring forth in South Carolina.'"
Butler for the appointment of Postmaster-General Key, to-day in conversation, spoke of the following rules as proper to be observed in the appointment of postmasters: "First, No removal during four years except for cause."
Second, When a postmaster has served four years and been a good officer, he is only to be removed for cause.
Third, When he has served eight years, so our form of government is republican, and he may become inattentive to his duties, it is then that reasonable cause must be shown that others should be submitted to the people for an expression of preference.
The Entomological Commission.
The entomological commission will have its headquarters in Prof. Hayden's office in Washington, and their western office, in which the larger part of their work is to be done, will be at St. Louis. Prof. Riley will visit the whole country east of the mountains and south of the 48th parallel; also the west half of Iowa and the whole of British America. Prof. Thomas will take Dakota and East Wyoming, while Prof. Packard will make Montana, Idaho, West Wyoming, and the Pacific slope his field. The entomological history, remedies, preventive measures, the meteorological and geographical bearings of the subject, etc., will also be discussed and allowed to facilitate the work of the commission.
The Wrecked Steamer "Holland."
LONG BRANCH, 21.—The steamer Holland lies about the same as yesterday. It is too rough to work in the surf. The boats of the Coast Wrecking Commission, which have been authorized of the shore about half a mile, are making a great deal of work for a while, to-day, in discharging a barrel of water from the steamer. The steamer still crashes on the rocks, and it is feared that it will not be able to get off.

and the shore is strewn with fragments of the hull. The flow of the steamer is resting on the rocks. She does not sink, but her stern is settling rapidly.

A Murderer Sentenced.
LOUISVILLE, 21.—At Shelbyville, to-day, Ben F. Mickey, regarded as the worst desperado in Kentucky, was convicted of the murder of John P. Wilson, in Oldham County, a year ago, and sentenced to penal servitude for life. This was his fourth murder.
The Suit of Higgins Against General Grant.
The summons to answer in the case, entered for Thomas Higgins against ex-President Grant, was served to-day on General Grant at the residence of ex-Secretary Fish. General Grant regards the entering of this case as a kind of black mark upon the part of Higgins, and although the statute of limitation clearly bars this action, he still thinks it his duty to go for the purpose of having all the facts brought out and vindicating the accusations cast upon his character by the plaintiff. He will not fight the case in the hands of his attorney, with instructions to have the case brought to trial as early as possible.
