PROSPEROUS CAMP OF MANHATTAN

Ten Hoisting Plants in Operation With Eight Others In Transit.

NEW MILLS TO BE ERECTED.

Site Selected for One of Them Near Central—Round Mountain Mines to Be Equipped With Stamps.

Manhattan, Nev., June 23.—Never before in the brief but record-establishing history of Manhattan has mining activity been as pronounced as at present, and never before were the mines and prospects being developed as advantageously. As depth is gained the ledges are maintaining their gold grade and are making into sulphides, a condition which proves beyond question the permanency of both the veins and their precious metal values.

Every property in the camp which is being actively worked is showing marked improvement. The period of comparative inactivity which followed the withdrawal of San Francisco capital after the first major fire in that city of April 15, has been counteracted by an influx of money from the east and middle west and northern mining conditions again prevail.

There is not a mining operator or investor in the camp whose confidence in its future is lukewarm, but in contradistinction each is imbued with a spirit of optimism founded upon recent developments of various properties. One of the very best signs of confidence which mining men have in the Manhattan district is demonstrated by the numerous plants of machinery which have been or are now being installed on the different estates.

Operations at the Pine Nut mine are being facilitated by means of a 50-horse power steam hoist, the Manhattan Consolidated people are utilizing one of the largest steam hoists in the mining power and at the Stay Dog a 50-horse power steam plant is in operation. The Jumping Jack management is further developing by means of a 15-horsepower gasoline hoist, a gasoline hoist of 25-horsepower supplies motive power at the Indian Camp; two 15-horsepower gasoline hoists are being utilized at the Union No. 9, and gasoline hoists each of 15-horsepower, are in use at the Little Grey and Mustard. There is likewise in the camp gasoline hoists of 15-horsepower each for the following named properties: The Manhattan Standard, Saylor-Humphrey, Manhattan Buffalo, Stay Dog, Consolidated Extension, Manhattan Mining and Wolfstone. A gasoline hoist of 25-horse power has also been ordered for the Sphinx estate in the Round Mountain section.

PLANTS IN OPERATION.

A comparison of the number of hoisting plants in operation in Manhattan within six months after the first discovery of gold with the number operated at Goldfield during the first year of its existence is somewhat interesting as it apparently indicates that the mining men of this section are more sanguine of future success than were those of Goldfield in the early days of that thriving mining metropolis.

At the close of the first twelve months of Goldfield's meteoric history hoists were in operation on the Combination, January, Florence, Portland and June, the latter property leading the list with two plants, making a total of six plants.

Six months after birth Manhattan has 10 hoisting plants in operation, with eight others in transit to the camp including the one listed to the Spinx property at Round mountain. The record is one of which the residents of the district can well be proud, as it thoroughly demonstrates the confidence mining men in general have in this field.

MILLS GOING UP.

The camp is likewise to be supplied with milling facilities aside from the large stamp mills which the companies contemplate erecting for the treatment of their ores. The mill is to be equipped with Elgin rolls, having a capacity equal to 15 stamps, and will treat 40 tons of ore each 24 hours. Manhattan capital is behind the enterprise and an order for the machinery has been closed. A site has been secured in the camp and the time by the time the machinery arrives everything will be in readiness for its installation.

A number of mining companies are also preparing to establish milling plants at their properties, included in the list being the Yellow Horse, Pine Nut, Buffalo, Consolidated Extension and Little Grey. The latter company's plant is to have a stamp capacity sufficient to handle its own and a large custom tonnage.

MILLS FOR ROUND MOUNTAIN.

In the Round Mountain section the Round Mountain Red Top company, in which R. L. Colburn, formerly of Salt Lake City, but now of Goldfield, is heavily interested, is preparing to "incorporate" its stamp plant, the machinery for which has already been ordered. A single stamp plant is to be erected for experimental purposes by the Round Mountain Mining company, owner of the famous Sunnyside group, scene of the original discovery in the Round Mountain country. Later in the intention of the company to establish a large plant in which will be treated the entire production of the property, including the high grade shipping ore.
