LOCAL BRIEFS

Patriarch C. C. A. Christensen's panorama of Church history will be exhibited in the Fourteenth ward assembly room tomorrow (Thursday) evening, in the Scandinavian meeting, commencing at 8 o'clock. The lecture will be given by Elder Christensen.

The mass meeting called for last evening, in Federation hall to agitate in interest of the initiative and referendum, was a success. A good deal of a fight was made. At 8:30 the audience was so small that the managers of the affair threw up the sponge and quit. Another attempt will be made Sunday night.

Chaplain J. T. Axon of the Eighteenth infantry has been ordered away, and leaves Feb. 15 next for Fort Leavenworth, where he will join his regiment on its arrival there from the Philippines. The Chaplain will be much missed in this city, where he has been active in late in lecture work. He has practically recovered from his long siege of rheumatism.

Thomas J. Donkin, a well known resident of this city, has just received word of the death of his uncle, William Thornton, who passed away at his home in Battersea, London, Dec. 14, 1904, at the age of 53 years. It is expected that most of the dealers in meats and groceries will be present, as a general invitation has been extended to this class of merchants.

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UTAH LAWMAKERS AND LOS ANGELES

Probability of Legislature Making A Run Over New Salt Lake Route.

SENATOR CLARK HERE FEB. 1.

But One Mile of Heavy Work to Close Up Gap Separating Utah and California Ends of Road.

Members of the Legislature are congratulating themselves upon the fact that they are not having a great deal of work to do these days, and that the outlook from this time on is not for strenuous endeavor. There is going to be an effort to follow the advice of the governor and not burden the statute books with unnecessary laws. That means that the lawmakers will have some spare time on their hands—considerable, in fact. And yet there is considerable likelihood of an adjournment before the expiration of the usual sixty days. Accordingly there are members who are commencing to plan for the usual legislative visit to some other state. Wyoming and Idaho have both been suggested. But there will be opposition to both of those suggestions, and members will look elsewhere. Already some of them have cast over the field and have come to the conclusion that a run down to Los Angeles and other southern California points over the new Salt Lake Route would be the proper thing. It is argued that great good would come from such a trip. That profit as well as pleasure would accrue. It is true that the road is not yet open for traffic, but it will be completed before the Legislature adjourns. In fact, there is not a great deal of work to do. The gap separating the two California points, the actual track to lay is not more than three miles in length at the present time, and but one mile of heavy grading was ordered.

Senator Clark, the father and builder of the road, is expected to be in Los Angeles on Feb. 1, and it is stated he will come to Salt Lake at that time to see the rails of his own road, and that it will not be long thereafter before the road may be opened to general traffic, in fact, just as soon as the necessary equipment arrives.

Governor Cutler is to be asked to accompany the lawmakers on their trip, providing it becomes a reality. And there appears to be little doubt that it will. It may be said by way of information that the governor is no stranger to Los Angeles, that in fact he is a sort of resident of that section, as he has bought residence property in the vicinity and last year he took a sea shore home for himself and family. It may be also said by way of information that this property has greatly appreciated in value, and that the section is building up rapidly. A trip such as is suggested would be undertaken and finished in a very few days, as the run each way will occupy not much more than twenty-four hours. It is highly probable that a large number of the lawmakers will go. The company the lawmakers and their friends on the journey, should it be made.

AFTER TONOPAH ROAD.

Harriman is Said to Have Made Proposition to Buy.

The Philadelphia Ledger of a recent date says that E. H. Harriman of the Southern Pacific Railroad company has been authorized to buy the Tonopah road from the Tonopah Mining company. Falling in that he threatens to put in a new standard gauge paralleling the present road from Rhodes to the Tonopah. Harriman's proposition under consideration, but there is a negative feeling among the officers that will probably result in a refusal to sell.

Under his article, says that the Tonopah road is the best paying railroad property in the United States, its net income being \$60,000 per month. The original cost of building the road is said to have been \$100,000, so that the company is receiving over 10 per cent a month on its investment.

Wyoming Railroad Bill.

Representative Morton has introduced in the Wyoming Legislature a bill providing that the rate of passenger fares on the railroad in Wyoming shall not exceed three cents a mile with half fare for children under 10 years of age. The bill relates what shall be termed a railroad under this act and fixes the penalty for violation at \$200 to \$1,000, the fine to be paid into the school fund of Wyoming.

Telephone Line Contract.

John Angus of Jensen, has been awarded the contract for the construction of a telephone line for the Utah Railway company from Dragon to White River. It is the intention of the company to extend the line to Vernal and Fort Duchesne at an early date.

Wants Congress to Go Slow.

The Erie Railroad company is mailing circulars over the signature of Louis Jackson, to the newspapers, commercial clubs, chambers of commerce and other institutions throughout the country urging that business organizations promptly pass a resolution to the effect:

"That this organization protests against the hurried legislation now proposed in regard to railroad rate matters, and believes that before any attempt be made to pass such bills adequate time should be given to the public to give to this stupendous subject so as to mature plans which will be for the interest of all."

On the passage of such a resolution, Mr. Jackson says, "I should like you to promptly send copies of same to your senators and representatives in Congress, to the chairman of the interstate commerce committee, to the chairman of the committee on interstate and foreign commerce, to your local newspapers and to such others as you see fit, by mail or telegraph or otherwise, such action by you will be to your business interests and conducive to the continued prosperity of the country."

SPIKE AND RAIL.

Once more has E. H. Dewey returned from the east and announced that arrangements have been practically completed for extending the Idaho Northern from Emmett to Horsehoe Bend, a distance of 20 miles.

President Hawley of the Iowa Central Railroad company is quoted as saying that the traffic agreement had been ratified with the Burlington road, whereby the Iowa Central gains an entrance into Des Moines. The Iowa

Central's nearest point to that city is Oskaloosa, about 60 miles distant. R. F. Neesen, general agent of the Burlington, received a dispatch yesterday afternoon announcing the death in Chicago of Thomas Miller, freight traffic manager of the system. Mr. Miller has been with the C. & B. Q. for years and was recognized as one of the best traffic men in the country.

The Denver & Rio Grande has filed an amendment to its charter in Colorado for the purpose of building two branches, one from Howard, Fremont county, Colo., south to the mineral lands, and the other from Sargents, Siskiyou county, Colo., south to Gunnison county. The branches have already been surveyed.

CUT PRICE OF FLOUR.

Drop is Twenty Cents Per Hundred Pounds—Corn is Down Ten Cents.

The Salt Lake Produce Exchange made the 20 cent cut in flour at yesterday afternoon's meeting that was predicted in the "News," and the exchange decided also on a reduction of 10 cents on corn. A further feature of the meeting was the sale of two cars of oats at \$1.35 per cwt. It was brought out by the dealers that the Colorado flour mills are clogged up very much the same as the Utah mills, and there was a report that the Colorado mills proposed unloading on Utah. This was an additional incentive to putting conditions here so that it would not pay the Colorado people to make any such attempt.

A MYSTERIOUS SHOT.

Bullet Fired Through Window by Unknown Person—Close Call to Death.

An extraordinary occurrence, bordering on criminality, came to light yesterday at the Hooper & Eldredge block, 49 East Temple street. At about 3:30 p. m. a crash was heard at one of the east windows of room No. 4. For a moment consternation reigned, and upon investigation it was found that a bullet had gone through the glass, just a little above the head of Miss Grace Dickson, who is employed in the photograph gallery on the floor. The bullet was standing within three or four feet of the window, and the shower of falling glass fell around her. In an adjoining room, separated from the other by only a thin partition, sat C. D. Harding, William Anderson and D. J. Williams, right in line of the bullet's course.

The hole made by the bullet convinced the police that the caliber was a large one, and was probably fired from a point above the mark in the window. But when it came or by whom fired it was a mystery. The police are making a rigid investigation of the affair.
