LOCAL BRIEFS.

Students Complete Tour.—The Colorado School of Mines students returned tonight from Butte and go east on Rio Grande No. 4.

Ashby Snow Selected.—Ashby Snow was chosen yesterday afternoon by the Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company in place of John M. Cannon, resigned.

Horticulturists to Meet.—The Salt Lake County Horticultural society will hold its regular meeting on May 16, 1908, at 1:30 p. m., in the City and County building.

Thief at Valley House.—William Stephenson, stopping at the Valley House, reported to the police yesterday afternoon that a thief had entered his room with a pass key and made off with a gold watch valued at \$140.

Wrench Deposits Big Check.—According to his agreement with the city council, A. M. Wrench, president of the Telluride Realty company, which is the owner of Federal Heights, deposited \$14,000.28 with the city treasurer yesterday, to pay for the laying of the water mains along the edge of the new addition. The city will commence laying the mains at once, and in 1909 Mr. Wrench will begin to receive his money back.

Engineers Meet Friday.—The Utah Society of Engineers will meet in the physical building of the state university Friday evening next. The regular meeting will be preceded by an informal reception to members, and visitors. Prof. R. E. Lyman will be on hand at 7:30 p. m., to welcome those attending. Mr. J. C. K. of C. in Convention.—At yesterday afternoon's annual convention of the Knights of Columbus, the first and second degrees were conferred upon a class of 29 at 2 p. m., and the third degree upon a class of 47 at 4 p. m. In the evening there was a banquet given by the officers of the grand lodge of Utah to the members of the Salt Lake council and friends. Over 100 persons present. The decorations were in red, white and blue. Delegates were present from the principal cities in the state.

Inspects Lemhi Reserve.—Inspector R. W. Reynolds of the forest service returned today from the Lemhi forest in Idaho. The settlers there wanted 10 townships on the Lost River watershed included in the reservation; but as the inspector found the tract contained no timber, he will not recommend its addition to the reservation. A moment later she caught the child with the tablets on at least of which he had already eaten a number. He was not long before medical aid was at hand, but death came to the child after 15 hours of suffering.

JOE GARCIA WILL NOT FACE TRIAL

Hybrid Dies in Seattle Hospital Following Gun Fight Last Week.

EMERY'S NARROW ESCAPE.

Chinese-Mexican Would Have Shot Him But His Gun Caught in the Lining of His Clothes.

Seattle, May 12.—Joseph Garcia, the Salt Lake desperado, wounded in a battle with officers last week, died at 2:30 a. m. in a hospital here.

Joe Garcia, the porch climber, thug, hold-up and murderer will not have to face a jury on a charge of committing the worst crime known to the law. His death at Seattle this morning removes from this sphere one of the most desperate and cunning crooks that ever infested this community.

Garcia was cool, crafty and ready to shoot to kill if interfered with. He had made the boast that he would never be taken alive and the officers did not hesitate to believe what they saw he was determined to resist arrest.

According to an eye witness of the shooting of the desperado, it was a mere accident that Sheriff Emery was not killed by the noted criminal. The eye witness says that Garcia did not take his eyes from Emery and there was a look of hatred in them as the fellow tried to draw his revolver and shoot the Salt Lake officer. One of the guns caught in the pocket of Garcia's coat and before he could get the gun into action the Seattle officers began pumping lead at him.

Sheriff Emery is now on his way to Salt Lake. While he did not bring back here to face trial for murder, he was the means of removing a cruel, desperate crook, Garcia, who in all probability, he buried at Seattle.

The name of the man who betrayed Garcia is still kept secret by the officials, but the belief grows stronger each day that the betrayer was "Tip" Belcher.

It would be worth while to know the feelings of Joe Sullivan now that Garcia is no more and hence could not testify against Sullivan should the latter succeed in getting a new trial. Had Garcia lived it is more than likely that some effort would have been made to give him a new trial. There would always be the fear that the Mexican-Chinese in his would say something that would go hard against Sullivan, but the dead and Sullivan can afford to smile.

On being notified of the death of Garcia the attorneys for Sullivan this morning wired the legal firm in Seattle which has been watching the Garcia case for the dying statement of the dead desperado. Upon this statement will undoubtedly hinge the action in the matter of taking an appeal in the Sullivan case.

SALT LAKE HAS GROWN.

Is the Verdict of Dr. A. Lepper of Berkeley, Cal., Late of Ogden.

Dr. A. Lepper, a patent medicine man of Berkeley, Cal., is in Salt Lake on his way through to the east and incidentally taking notes on the growth of Salt Lake since he was here 30 years ago.

"Do you know," he said this morning, "I was the first man to sell patent medicines on the streets of Salt Lake City. I was accorded the privilege free of charge and I did a great business. You can put me down as never knowing anything and I guess I never will," he mused sadly. "Salt Lake's growth is wonderful, and if I had only remained here and held on to what I had, I could have made a strike out of Berkeley. It is a great city. We have one show street, but it cannot compare to yours, which are so wide and well kept. Salt Lake certainly is the coming city of the west, and, on second thought, not coming, it has arrived."
