Funds have been arranged to complete and equip the system with branch lines as isquired, without selling any bonds, it being the purpose of the San Pedro company but to offer its securities until after its system is completed and has been in operation for some time. The material for building the system is all contracted for, subject to delivery as required.

The San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad company has executed a mortgage to the Equitable Trust company of New York as trustee under a first mortgage or deed of trust, dated July I. 1993, authorizing an issue of \$50,000,000 4 per cent 50-year gold bonds, payable Jan. I. and July 1.
