Mystery at Niagara.

Niagara, Falis, N. Y., Dec. 25 .- This evening two young men whose names are unknown, were driven to the cliff above the promenade at the Whirlpool rapids on the Canadian side of the river and were lowered to the Promenade. They did not return in an hour and search was made for them. No trace of them could be found and the police were notified. Footprints of the two men in the snow were followed to the extreme end of the promenade toward the whirlpool. Further along the bank there were signs of a body having fallen in the snow and the footprints of only one man could be discerned. Owing to the darkness the search had to be discontinued, but men are stationed along the river on the watch for the appearance of either of the men. The police are inclined to look on the mysterious affair as a case of murder and suicide or double suicide.

Virginia Tragedy.

Shot by Accident.

Topeka, Kan., Dec. 25.-Maggie Drayer, the fourteen-year-old daughter of John Drayer, was shot and instantly kiled at 6 o'clock this evening by Mrs. William Taylor. A number of children, including Maggie Drayer, were at the Taylor house playing with popguns, when Mrs. Taylor, saying that she had something that would beat their pop-suns, picket up an old musket, which she accidentally discharged. The entire load of shot entered the girl's breast. Death resulted immediately. It is feared Mrs. Taylor will lose her reason.

Testing Keneval Process.

Knoxville, Tenn., Dec. 25.-A new way of making coke, known as the Keneval process is undergoing a series I tests in this city under the direction I Tennessee Coal and Coke company. So far the tests have met expectations of its advocates and the hope is enrtained that a solution of the difficulles of coking coal with a high percentage of sulphur has at last been found. Tests are being made in Tennessee coal at present. In a few day's Ohio coals will be used.

The new process separates and makes available the bi-products, gas, am-monia and tar. Gas from the three ovens now in operation affords fuel for a boller near by. The Keneval process is in some respects similar to the Sal-val process used in the South at Birmingham, but is said to be simpler and less expensive

DIDN'T STAY DEAD.

As a Consequence Wolfsohn Releases

torney O'Bryan of the Insurance company regarding a restitution to the company of the \$10,000 insurance paid the Los Angeles county public administrator for the heirs of the supposed Wolfsohn. Following the conference Wolfsohn wrote out the following tele-

gram, addressed to the public administrator of Los Angeles: "I am alive and here in Chicago. order you to replace the money paid you by the Insurance company immediately. I sign this telegram in the presence of three witnesses, my bother in law, my uncle and the company's at-torney, E. O'Bryan.

Wolfsohn's assertion that he is alive only deepens the mystery regarding the identy and manner of death of the unidentified man. The latter's body was found in a lodging house of Los An-geles July 31 last.

The remarkable likeness between Wolfsohn and the unknown is shown by photographs exhibited by Mr. O'Bryan. Both are men of about 30 years of age with peculiarly shaped mouths, pointed chins and prominent noses and dark hair." In the corpse, however, the cheeks are slightly more sallow and the hair is darker than Wolfsohn's. By clipping the moustache tips of the dead man some one had made his facial appearance almost identical with that of the real policy holder.

According to Wolfsohn the first he heard of his reputed death was when he came to this city last month to visit his uncle. After a visit to his St. Louis relatives he returned, as he said, to clear up the matter. As a result of his conference with Mr. O'Brvan he signed the telegram that will secure to

GONE TO MOUNTAINS. Yaqui Indians Divide into Small Squads and Make Raids.

Chicago, Dec. 26 .- A · special to the Record from Austin, Texas, says: A dispatch from Guayamas, state of So-nora. Mexico, says that the force of Yaqui Indians that has been harrassing General Torres' troops for the past few weeks, has withdrawn into the moun-tains. The Indians divide into small bands at night and make raids on unprotected ranches and scouting parties of government troops. Many valuable ranch buildings belonging to Mexicans

AT HAVANA.

Havana, Dec. 25 .- All the stores in Havana closed at 10 o'clock this morning and the rest of the day was devoted

to conviviality. Only two newspapers appeared with the usual editions. Bands played on the Prado. Americans generally visited friends, most of those having families here giving dinners and inviting others of their acquaintance. Gen. Leonard Wood dined with Capt. L. M. AT CINCINNATI.

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 25.—The Salva-tion army fed 2,500 people at dinner to-day and distributed 1,500 baskets of provisions, which together are equivalent to giving a dinner to over 8,000 poor peo.

At San Diego the taller buildings were severely shi en up and plaster was shaken off and a few broken articles of household furniture were report ed, but no serious damage done. A high wave struck the beach on the ocean front soon after the shock, but no damage was done to shipping. A slighter shock followed the first one a few seconds later.

The only loss of life so far as known was at the Saboba Indian reserve, where six squaws were killed by failing walls. A number of Indians were seriously injured.

The shock was severe at Coronado but no serious damage is reported aside from slight wall cracks. The shock was also severe at Perris and Morono and in the latter place brick buildings were damaged.

At Ventura houses were badly shaken and clocks stopped, but no damage re-sulted. The vibrations were followed by a high wind and a heavy sea.

Santa Ana reports the severest earthquake in years. Third-story hotel guests were almost rolled out of bed. Clocks were stopped all over the city and the walls of several brick buildings were badly cracked. Hundreds of people were on the streets a few seconds after the shock, some appearing in night-clothes and remaining up until daylight.

Anaheim advices are that the heaviest earthquake shock ever known there occurred at 4:25 this morning. It lasted fully ten seconds and was violent from the beginning. Lodging houses were emptied and the streets were filled with shivering people. number of buildings were cracked, but no serious damages was done.

Orange and Needles both report a ter-rific shock of earthquake, stopping clocks, rattling windows, broke glass and gave the town a thorough shaking up.

Will Investigate Clark.

New York, Dec. 26 .- A special to the Herald from Washington, says: Members of the Senate committee on privileges and elections declare that they will carry on the investigation of Senator Clark's case without regard to the decision of the Montana supreme court, under which John B. Wellcome was lisbarred from practice on charges of bribery in connection with Senator lark's election.

"We sit as a court," said one of the members, "and we consider all the facts bearing upon these cases in a purely judicial manner. Even if the supreme court had declared that Calrk himself was guilty of attempts to bribe, or whatever they charge him with, we could pay no attention to it. He was not a party to the case, and of course had no chance to present his side. We have nothing whatever to do with Mr. Wellcome. We will try the Clark case on its merits."
