# CHURCH TO BE DEDICATED.

New Edifice of First Methodist Finished at Cost of \$80,000.

= IS A HANDSOME BUILDING.

Sermon Tomorrow Will be Preached By Bishop David H. Moore-Description of the Structure.

The First Methodist people will dedicate their new church tomorrow morning, with Bishop David H. Moore to preach the sermon. The new edifice is located at the corner of Second South and Second East streets, directly opposite the site of the old First Presbyterian church, and the cost of the new edifice with the lot is put at \$80,000. The church auditorium is so arranged that it can be nearly doubled in seating capacity by throwing open the Sunday school auditorium adjoining, so that the total seating copacity is estimated at 1,500. The furnishings are in dark oak, with pews down stairs, and opera chairs up stairs in the galleries. The Sunday school room is provided with stall boxes, so that the classes will be by themselves in the study of the least of the church are of stalned glass. One is "The Resurrection," furnished by the pioneer Methodist ministers of this territory, and state. Another represents "The Good Shepherd," presented by Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Pond of this city, in memory of the late Samuel Pond. A third window, "Jesus, the Light of the World," is the gift of Mrs. Esther Waldfogel, in memory of her husband. The site for the church was bought last May, and the following members of the church composed the building committee; G. F. Goodwin, J. P. Cobb, A. S. Peters, O. A. Honnold, James E. Paine, J. C. The first services of the First Methodist church of the city were held in

The following year the well known east Third South street site was purchased from H. W. Lawrence for \$1,500, the board of church extension furnishing \$500, and the remainder being raised by citizens. The corner stone was laid Nov. 20, 1871, by Rev. Plerce as the first pastor.

The church was dedicated in the fall f 1874. The structure cost over \$40,-90. Chaplain C. C. McCabe, now a bishop, was instrumental in securing a large portion of this money by lecturing through Utah.
