

ALVA ADAMS CARRIES COLORADO

His Plurality Over Gov. Peabody
Will be Not Less Than Five
Thousand.

ROOSEVELT SWEEPS THE STATE.

He Has Twenty Thousand Plurality—
Notable Feature of Election
Was the Scratching.

Denver, Nov. 9.—Estimates based on the returns received up to 9 o'clock today indicate that Roosevelt's plurality in Colorado will be about 20,000, and that Alva Adams, Democrat, will have at least 5,000 plurality over Gov. James H. Peabody, Republican, for governor. Returns on the scratched ballots, estimated at more than 50,000 in the state, are coming in slowly. So far as counted these ballots average two to one in favor of Adams. Adams loses many counties which have always been considered safely Republican. Returns of the congressional vote indicate the election of John F. Shafroth, Democrat, as congressman-at-large, and of Robert W. Bonny, Republican, in the first district, and Herschel M. Hogg, Republican, in the second district.

The remarkable feature of the balloting in Colorado was the number of scratched votes, which, in some counties, were 80 per cent of the total. The Democrats claim that this scratching was done in favor of Adams, while the Republicans assert that Peabody received his share of the scratched votes.

The News (Dem.) maintained this morning that according to the best estimate that could be made from incomplete returns from most of the counties, Adams has been elected governor by a plurality of 10,000 to 12,000, and that he carried Denver county by over 3,000. It claims that the entire state ticket and Shafroth and Whitford, candidates for Congress, have been elected and that the election of Maupin to Congress from the second district is probable.

The News also says that the Democrats will control both branches of the legislature if present indications are verified.

The Republicans, on the other hand, claim that Peabody has been re-elected by a plurality of at least 10,000 and that Denver, which has been the Democratic stronghold at recent elections, has been carried by the Republican ticket. The claim is made that Roosevelt has run only 6,000 to 8,000 ahead of his ticket. It is also claimed by the Republicans that the next legislature will be Republican.

In making these claims neither paper offered any different figures to support them.

Chairman Milton Smith, of the state Democratic committee, issued a statement this morning claiming the election of Alva Adams for governor and the entire Democratic ticket for other state officers and for Congress by pluralities ranging from 14,000 to 15,000. He also claims that the Democrats will have a majority in the legislature, which canvasses the vote for governor. Republican Chairman D. E. Fairley said that the Republican state ticket and candidates for Congress were unquestionably elected, by pluralities of 12,000 to 15,000, and that the Republicans would control the legislature.

Both sides are claiming nearly every close county. The Democrats estimate the plurality in Denver for Adams at about 4,000 and the Republicans still claim it for Peabody by 2,000.

PRESIDENT OVERWHELMED WITH CONGRATULATIONS.

Washington, Nov. 9.—President Roosevelt was overwhelmed with congratulations today. They were presented by many people in person and were received by mail and by telegraph from every state and from almost every city in the country. Thousands of telegrams already have been received and they are coming yet in an undiminished flood. It will practically be impossible for the president and Secy. Loeb to acknowledge each message in accordance with the usual custom at the White House, but President Roosevelt desires it to be understood that he appreciates to the full the expression of his friends and would be glad if it were possible for him personally to greet and thank every one of them.

The president was in exuberant spirits today. Although he did not retire until a late hour last night he

STORY DENIED.

Manager of Hardware Co. Says Institution is Not in Politics.

Mr. B. F. Bauer, manager of the Salt Lake Hardware company, denies emphatically the truth of the statement that that institution tried to control the votes of its employees, and directed that votes be cast against "Mormons" on both Democratic and Republican tickets. The statement was brought to the "News" by several people, who said that employees had been furnished with specific ballots with a request made that they vote them and that the name of every "Mormon" except one, be crossed off both the Republican and Democratic ballots.

Mr. Bauer says that the institution takes no part in politics. He hires "Mormons" and Gentiles alike, and his own vote contained the names of men of both classes. He says that doubtless the men in the establishment did campaigning for their friends, as they do in every establishment; there was considerable importuning back and forth, but that the institution tried to direct its employees how to vote, is entirely untrue.

HAS ROOSEVELT CARRIED MISSOURI?

Chairman Niedringhaus Says His Majority is Not Less Than Twenty Thousand.

Indications Are That Legislature Will Be Republican on Joint Ballot.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 9.—Slow progress has been made toward an accurate count of Missouri's vote, but partial returns up to 11 o'clock today showed remarkable Republican gains in St. Louis and throughout the state. In many counties the usual Democratic plurality was cut in half. The Post-Dispatch, (Ind. Dem.), at that hour inclined largely toward the conviction that Roosevelt had carried Missouri and the Republican state committee insisted that final returns would show a Republican majority of 20,000 on the national ticket.

That Joseph W. Folk, Democrat, has carried the state for governor, was the claim made generally, but figures on the state result were lacking. The Democratic state committee asserted that Folk will show a majority of 30,000. Contrary returns show that St. Louis has gone Republican with the exception that she rallied for Folk, Democrat, with a plurality of over 10,000. With all the Democratic municipal candidates save one defeated by pluralities ranging from 500 to 3,000, Folk carried St. Louis over Cyrus P. Walbridge by a plurality of 10,000. One of the hardest fought political contests in the election was that for secretary of state. The returns show that Samuel R. Cook, Democrat, and present incumbent in office, is defeated by John E. Swanger by a plurality of 10,000.

The national ticket result in St. Louis was close, but Roosevelt's plurality is 2,888, his vote being Roosevelt 55,056; Parker, 52,970.

The indications are that the legislature will be Republican by two or three votes on a joint ballot. The legislature will elect a successor to United States Senator F. M. Cockrell.

The prosecution and wending out of bootlers and hoodlums, brought to light under Democratic administration, is believed to have helped in great part in forcing a Republican wave over Missouri.

Thomas K. Niedringhaus, the Republican state chairman, when seen, was highly elated over the result.

"My prediction of last night has proved to be a good one," he said. "There was a Republican landslide and it could not miss Missouri."

"We have carried the state for Roosevelt by no less than 20,000, and I believe that Walbridge has come so close to the election that Mr. Folk's hair must be standing on end."

"We have carried the legislature. "In St. Louis the result is startling, but it is no surprise to me. "I cannot speak accurately, as we know but little of the figures as yet."

FOLK ELECTED.

Kansas City, Nov. 9.—The Times (Independent) at 10 a. m. says:

"At this hour, with increased Democratic losses in the county, the indications point more strongly to the probability that Roosevelt and Fairbanks have carried Missouri and that the plurality for Joseph W. Folk, Democrat, for governor over Cyrus P. Walbridge, Republican, will be something like 20,000."

"It is also becoming more than a possibility that the next legislature, which will elect a successor to Senator Francis Pickens, Democrat, will be Republican."

"Returns from the country are coming in slowly and figures will be late. "William S. Cowherd, chairman of the Democratic national congressional committee, is defeated by E. C. Ellis of Kansas City, from the Fifth Missouri district by plurality of about 1,200."

REPUBLICANS CLAIM STATE.

Kansas City, Nov. 9.—The Star (Ind.), at 10:45 a. m., claims that the Republicans have carried Missouri for the national ticket, but gives no figures and claims the election of Folk, (Dem.), for governor.

NO THIRD TERM FOR MASSACHUSETTS.
