NELSON EXPLAINS.

State Superintendent of Schools Deals With Per Capita.

State Superintendent of Schools Nelson, foaring that a certain statement in his biennial report, relating to the amount expended per capita in school work in a number of the states, might be misleading, desires, through the press, to explain the matter and put

it in the right light before the public The statement referred to follows:

"The amount per capita expended for school purposes, based on the total pupulation of the respective states, in 1900 was: Maine, \$2,47; Vermont, \$3.13; New York, \$1.60; Pennsylvania, \$3.41; North Carolina, 51 cents: South Caro Ina. 67 cents: Georgia, 89 cents: South Caro-lina. 67 cents: Georgia, 89 cents: Mon-tana, 83.51; Wyoming, \$2.74; Colorado, \$5.18; Nevada, \$5.30; Idaho, \$2.47; Ore-gon, \$3.85; California, \$4.65. The araount per capita for Utah in 1900 was \$4.63; in 1901, \$4.87; in 1902, \$5.20."
