LIBERTY OF CONSCIENCE.

"To discriminate against a thorough by upright citizen because he belongs to some particular church, or because like Abraham Lincoln, he has not to some particular church, or because like Abraham Lincoln, he has not avowed his allegiance to any church, is an outrage against that liberty of conscience which is one of the founda-tions of American liberty. You are entitled to know whether a man seek-ing your suffrages is a man of clean and upright life, honorable in all his dealings with his fellows, and fit by qualification and purpose to do well in the great office for which he is a can-didate; but you are not entitled to know matters which lie purely between himself and his Maker. If it is proper or legitimate to oppose a man for being a Unitarian, as was John Quincy Adams, or, for instance, as the Rey. Edward Everett Hale, at the present moment chaplain of the senate and an American whose life all good Ameri-cans are proud of, then it would be equally proper to support or oppose a man because of views on justifica-tion by fuilth, or the method of admin-istering the Sacrament, or the gospel of salvation by works. If you once enter on such a careor, there is absolutely no limit at which you can legitimateiy efforts. limit at which you can legitimately
