Washington, June 9 .- One of the most important conferences in the history of western railroads will be held here today when executive officals of the railroads, the interstate commerce commission and shippers from many cities will meet to consider western otties will incer to consider western freight rates. The conference is to be held at the instance of the commission, which is trying to iron out the rough spots in the new western freight rate adjustment made necessary by the de-cision of the commission in the Spokane

DECISION IS REVERSED.

Case of U. S. Against Southern Pacific Remanded for New Trial.

The United States Circuit court

appeals has reversed the decision of the United States District Court of Utah, in the case of the United States against the Southern Pacific Railway company, the Southern Pacific Rallway company, and a new trial has been ordered. The case whis tried during the April term of 1998, and a verdict of guilty was ordered by the court on two counts out of a total of eight, for the alleged contravention of the safety appliance act of March 2, 1893, which requires that all cars must have automatic couplers which will prevent men going between the cars. Judgment was then entered for \$200 and \$77.50 costs. The case was then appealed with the result that a new trial has been ordered.

EMPEY HELD BY SHERIFF.

Alfred Empey, arrested at Salt Palace on the night of June 3, and charged with a statutory offense, appeared before Judge Bowman yes-terday and entered a plea of not guilty. His preliminary hearing was set for Jume 16, and in default of \$500 bonds he is still held in the custody of the sheriff.
