

## WILL CONSIDER WESTERN RATES

Important Conference Being Held  
At National Capital  
Today.

### AT INSTANCE OF COMMISSION.

Officials Trying to Iron Out Rough  
Spots in New Western Freight  
Rate Adjustment.

Washington, June 9.—One of the most important conferences in the history of western railroads will be held here today when executive officials of the railroads, the interstate commerce commission and shippers from many cities will meet to consider western freight rates. The conference is to be held at the instance of the commission, which is trying to iron out the rough spots in the new western freight rate adjustment made necessary by the decision of the commission in the Spokane rate case.

From Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, Spokane, San Francisco, Denver, Salt Lake City and other jobbing centers which will be affected by the new adjustment of freight rates, prominent representatives of civic bodies and of commercial organizations have been sent to protest against the rates which the railroads have proposed to inaugurate.

### RAILROAD IMPROVEMENTS.

Denver & Rio Grande to Spend \$10,000  
At Grand Junction.

Grand Junction, Colo., June 9.—Forty thousand dollars will be spent by the Denver & Rio Grande railroad in improving its freight handling facilities here according to reliable information given out here today. The improvements will consist of largely increased trackage, additional platforms and ice houses to care for the fruit shipments. It is stated that work will start July 1.

### SPIKE AND RAIL.

Instructive Folder—"Through Colorado and Yellowstone park to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition" is the title of an illustrated folder issued by the Hook Island-Frisco Lines, which is descriptive of the west and the northwest. The folder is very complete, and contains half-toned pictures of the Salt Lake route and other points of interest en route to the exposition city, as well as profuse illustrations of Seattle and the fair.

Dickenson Promoted—W. W. Dickenson, formerly traveling passenger agent of the New York Central lines in this city, and later commercial agent at Seattle, will be soon transferred to San Francisco as commercial agent for the lines at that point, according to reports received in this city. The promotion is a deserved one and Mr. Dickenson's friends will be pleased to learn of his advancement.

Floods Easing Up—The flood situation along the Denver & Rio Grande lines through the fruit shipping country is easing up somewhat and traffic is reinstated on the Park City branch. Many men are at work in the washed-out district in Provo canyon, and the line to Heber will soon be in commission again.

### TRIBUTE FROM PRINCIPALS

Resolutions Adopted in Recognition of  
Judge Henderson's Worth.

When the Salt Lake City Principals' association met yesterday, the following tribute to Judge Henderson and expression of sympathy for his family were unanimously adopted:

Let us resolve to make the harmony which was expressed in the life of the loyal friend a part of our lives, that he may continue to live, and that his life may be a perpetual benediction.

## DESERTED HIS BRIDE ON THEIR HONEYMOON

Mrs. Minnie Berlin Left Penalties in  
Salt Lake Sues for Divorce  
From Husband.

Deserted here on her honeymoon a few days after their marriage, Mrs. Minnie Berlin, a young and pleasant looking woman, seeks a divorce from George Berlin in a complaint filed in the Third district court. They were married in Denver on July 8, 1908. Immediately afterward they came to Salt Lake, with the intention of staying a short time. Berlin left her home and any money or friends. Since that time she has made this city her home and has supported herself. All she asks is a divorce. In her complaint she says nothing of the whereabouts of her husband.

### CLAIMS SPARKS CAUSED FIRE.

Charles M. Hansen has brought suit in the Third district court against the Denver & Rio Grande railroad company to recover \$3,300 as damages for the destruction of his property by fire. It is alleged in the complaint that he owned a house south of the city limits situated near the railroad tracks. He claims that the sparks from an engine set fire to his house and burned it to the ground.

### TAKEN UNDER ADVISEMENT.

Arguments Heard in Case Against the  
County Commissioners.

Arguments were heard yesterday by Judge Armstrong on the demurrer filed in the case of Salt Lake county against the county commissioners and their bondsmen. Hiram E. Booth, United States district attorney, represented the defendants and County Attorney Job P. Lyon represented the county. The matter was taken under advisement. The suit was filed to compel the county commissioners to repay to the county treasurer \$5,727.50 which it is alleged was illegally paid to the Inter-Mountain Republican for publishing the delinquent tax notices. The defendants filed a general demurrer on the ground that the facts set forth were not sufficient to make a cause of action.

### DECISION IS REVERSED.

Case of U. S. Against Southern Pacific  
Remanded for New Trial.

The United States circuit court of appeals has reversed the decision of the United States district court of Utah, in the case of the United States against the Southern Pacific Railway company, and a new trial has been ordered. The case was tried during the April term of 1908, and a verdict of guilty was ordered by the court on two counts out of a total of eight, for the alleged contravention of the safety appliance act of March 2, 1893, which requires that all cars must have automatic couplers which will prevent men going between the cars. Judgment was then entered for \$200 and \$75 costs. The case was then appealed with the result that a new trial has been ordered.

### EMPEY HELD BY SHERIFF.

Alfred Empey, arrested at Salt Palace on the night of June 3, and charged with a statutory offense, appeared before Judge Bowman yesterday and entered a plea of not guilty. His preliminary hearing was set for June 16, at which time \$500 bonds he is still held in the custody of the sheriff.

### AIRING TANGLE IN COURT.

Mrs. Helen Smith, otherwise known as Helen Blazes, once a notorious lewd, brought suit against Harry J. Robinson, an attorney, and Edna Prescott, another well known denizen, for \$1,200 rent of a house in Victoria alley which was used for a long time by Helen Blazes. In the beginning of the year 1908, Helen Blazes gave up her business and rented the house to Harry J. Robinson. He subleased it in return to Edna Prescott. The latter left the place June 7, taking her furniture and owing six months' rent. W. R. Hutchinson is acting as attorney for Helen Blazes.

### COMMISSION IS AWARDED.

Stowe & Palmer, real estate agents, were granted judgment for \$100 against Jackson Jones yesterday by Judge Lewis as a commission for the sale of 40 acres of land. The property was listed with Stowe and Palmer and Jones afterward sold it on his own account.

### WESTERN PACIFIC SUED.

Mrs. Katherine A. Keller has filed suit in the Third district court to recover \$10,000 damages from the Western Pacific Railroad company for damage to her property. The land involved is described as lot 3, block 50, plat C, Salt Lake City survey.

### BOGDAN HELD FOR MURDER.

Peter Bogdan, an Austrian, was charged with the murder of George Tedovich, another Austrian, in a complaint issued Monday by County Attorney.

### COURT NOTES.

Spiers to recover \$867.75 as commission for finding a customer for some land he offered for sale. Spiers listed with the firm fifty-one acres of land in Mill Creek which he held at \$12,000. The real estate firm found a customer, and then Spiers refused to sell.

J. H. Worrell, administrator of the estate of J. T. Farris, has filed suit in the Third district court to recover \$25,000 as damages against the Garfield Smelting company for the death of Farris. While repairing a converter, the crane broke and Farris was crushed to death on Oct. 19, 1908. He is survived by a widow and six children.

Mrs. Mildred Stevers seeks a divorce from William M. Stevers in a suit filed in the Third district court in which she alleges desertion and non-support. They were married at Gerlitz, Colorado, on Nov. 4, 1894, and have six children.

John I. Sherman has filed suit in the Third district court against Salt Lake City to recover \$500 for damages to property in Tenth South street on account of the change of the grade. It is alleged that the value of his property has decreased because the egress and ingress to the property has been destroyed.

A. B. Johnson filed suit for divorce from Lydia V. Johnson in the charge of desertion. He alleges that she tried to marry him after their marriage and has since that time refused to live with him. They were married on April 5, 1885, in Tullahoma, Tenn.

Arena M. Kelly brought suit for divorce against John W. Kelly yesterday in the Third district court. They were married in Pueblo, Colo., on Sept. 3, 1900, and for the last two years, she says that Kelly has refused to provide for her. They have two minor children and Mrs. Kelly asks for their custody.

Robert Danis and Frank Beckstead filed suit in the Third district court against the Union Pacific Railroad company to recover damages amounting to \$7,838.90. It is alleged that by the delay of trains their shipment of sheep from Wyoming to Omaha, Neb., on Oct. 19, 1908, went without feed and water and reduced them in flesh, and that they were unable to get the market price for them.

The L. Wolf Manufacturing company filed suit in the Third district court against Samuel J. Tobin and William F. Keyting to recover \$1,238.44. It is alleged that this amount is due on a bill of goods delivered to the defendants several months ago.
