At a recent meeting of the Salt Lake Clearing House executive committee the following resolution was adopted to the following resolution was adopted to take effect April 1 next: "Whereas, It is universally admitted that the allow-ance of overdrafts at banks is an un-wise system of banking as compared with the more conservative system which enables the banker to retain control of his resources at all times; and Whereas, the banks of this asso-ciation have decided to abandon the allowance of current overdraft ac-counts, therefore be it, Resolved by the Sait Lake City Clearing House that Salt Lake City Clearing House that the banks of this association will, in accordance with their said agreement promptly notify their customers that overdrafts will not be allowed for a longer period than 48 hours, and also that the Clearing House banks will in all fairness support each other in car-rying out this regulation in letter and n spirit.
