

## ROCKEFELLER, JR. FEELS OUTRAGED

New York, Dec. 17.—On a charge of criminal libel, made by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., S. S. Carvalho, president of the Star company, publishers of William R. Hearst's New York American, was arrested today and arraigned in police court before Magistrate Flinn. At

the solicitation of Clarence J. Shearn, attorney for the Hearst publications, and without any objections being raised on the part of the assistant district attorney, Mr. Garvin, who had charge of the prosecution, Mr. Carvalho was paroled in the custody of his lawyer until Dec. 26.

Mr. Rockefeller, accompanied by his counsel, Lawyer Murphy, appeared in Dist. Atty. Jerome's office early in the day and made complaint that the article published in the New York American of Dec. 15, with the headline "J. D. Rockefeller, Jr. Originated Peonage in Stockade, It Is Said," tended to injure his good name, reputation and credit, and to make him appear ridiculous.

He submitted a typewritten affidavit embodying these charges to Asst. Dist.

Atty. Garvin, to whom the case was assigned. On the presentation of the affidavit to Magistrate Flinn, he issued warrants for the arrest of Mr. Carvalho, Bradford Merrill, treasurer, and Edward H. Clark, secretary of the Star company.

Mr. Carvalho was found in his office, Merrill and Clark were not in their offices. Mr. Carvalho took his arrest good-naturedly.

Mr. Rockefeller was not present when Mr. Carvalho was arraigned, as he did not expect that the warrants would be served today. Lawyer Shearn, after pleading to have Mr. Carvalho paroled in his custody, said Mr. Merrill had not arrived at the office when the detective called, but that he would appear in court tomorrow. Mr. Clark was in California, Mr. Shearn said.

Chicago, Dec. 17.—The story of an alleged peonage system and stockade at Summit, a town 30 miles from Chicago, is under investigation by the district attorney. Those who brought the charges, declare that the stockade surrounding the plant is 20 feet high; that workmen are practically kept prisoners; that they were kept in debt to their employers, and some of them escaped to tell their story only by digging a tunnel under the stockade. The officials of the plant deny the charges, declaring it to be the result of spite-work. They assert they have taken only such precautions as will protect them against labor troubles and against strangers entering their premises without authority. A number of witnesses conferred with the district attorney today, and it is expected that any action

that might be taken will be announced within a few days.

### TO FIGHT TAMMANY.

In Next Campaign Republicans Will Use Stereopticon Views.

New York, Dec. 18.—How Republicans in the next municipal campaign will use stereopticon views to fight Tammany Hall by showing the alleged waste and squandering of the city's funds was shown last night by Henry Bruere, director of the bureau of municipal research in an address before the Republican county committee. Cartoons from newspapers were thrown on a screen as the speaker scored city officials while

under the caption "A Yard of Lemons," pictures of articles which the city is alleged to have paid exorbitant prices were shown what was declared to be reasonable and normal prices for the same were exhibited as a basis for comparison. "I shall be pleased to deliver this same lecture before Tammany Hall," said the speaker during the course of the evening.

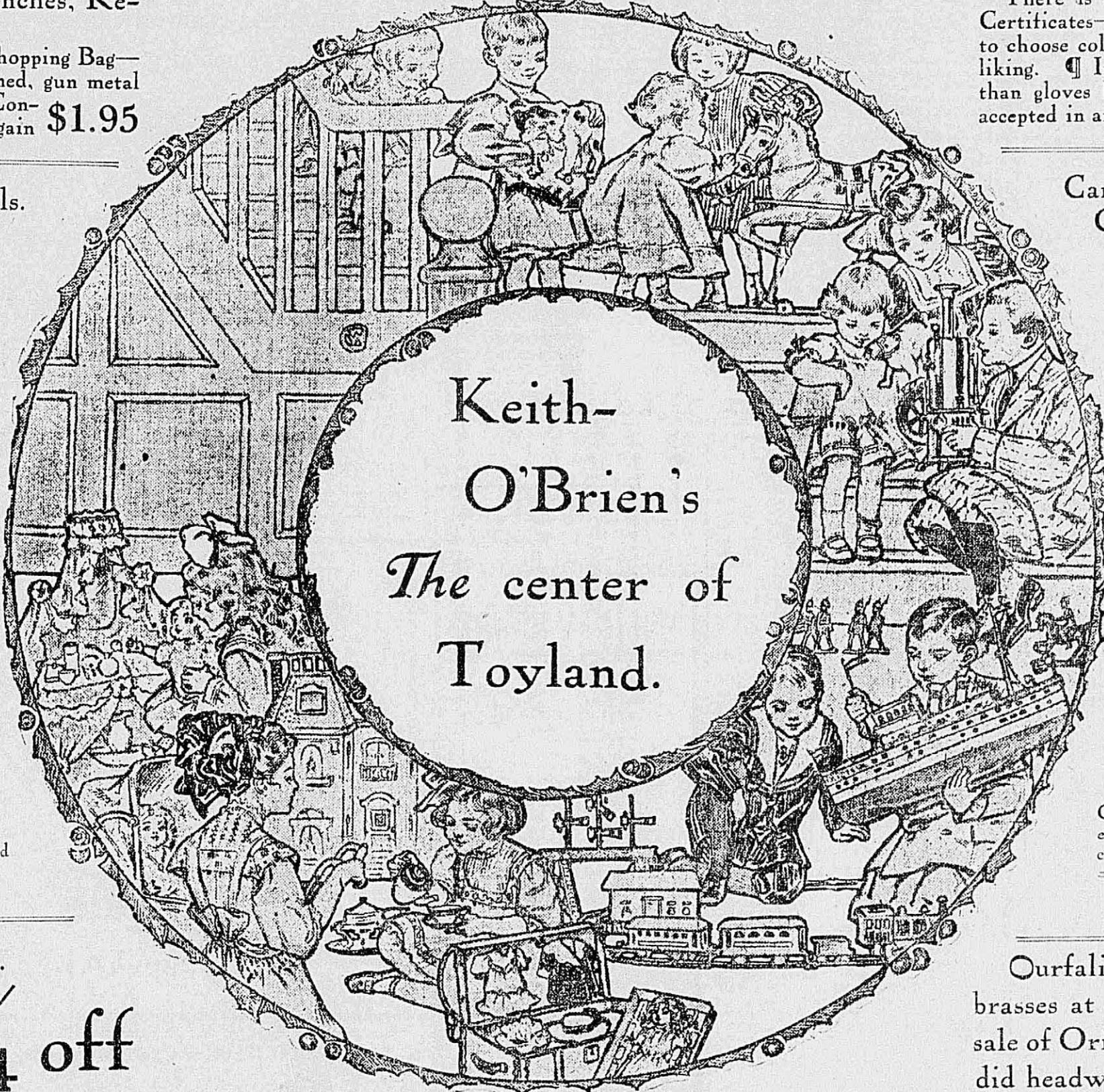
