### OVATION TO SCHLEY

By the Good People of City o New Orleans.

New Orleans, Feb. 20.-Admiral Schley, Col. A. W. McClure and Gen. Joseph Wheeler were given an ovation by the people of New Orleans this afby the people of New Orleans this ar-ternoon. They came at the invitation of the Progressive union, and after the Crescent theater had been filled 2,000 people stood around the doorways clamoring for admittance. In his speech Admiral Schley said, in part: "Most of my life during the half-cen-tury past has been spent on the outer confines of civilization, guarding our inconfines of civilization, guarding our in-terests beyond observation or the sympathy of the people. Those with whom I served did so uncomplainingly and had little to comfort them beyond that glorious insignia under which we served and beyond that irresistible power to

reward or condemn unsparingly. "There is no discounting Jack's love of home and his flag," the admiral con-tinused, "and when he is at sea his dream is of his sweetheart, but his ship is his loyal love and his country God's own country. He is always ready, no matter how forlorn the hope, ready to lead and lay down his life. Behind the gun he is the peer of any marksman in the world. #### Both Houses of Delaware Legislature Take Action on It.
