

RULING ON CRIMINAL LIBEL

In Case of Indianapolis News: If Owners Not Present Could Not Be Guilty.

MALICE MUST BE EXPRESSED.

Defendants Successfully Resist, Temporarily at Least, Removal to District of Columbia for Trial.

Indianapolis, June 1.—Deavan Smith and Charles Williams, editors of the Indianapolis News, today successfully resisted, for the moment at least, their removal to the District of Columbia to stand trial for criminal libel on account of publishing articles intimating that there was enormous graft in the Panama canal purchase.

Lawyers for the publishers denied malice in the stories and editorials complained of. They gained from Judge Anderson a ruling that evidence should be introduced to this effect.

The defendants committed no offense for which they could be removed to another district for trial, they said. Attorneys for the government vigorously resisted the introduction of testimony but were overruled.

Judge Anderson, in his ruling, declared malice in a civil action was different from malice in a criminal case. Implied malice in a newspaper publication might be sufficient to justify a judgment for damages against the publisher. But in a criminal action a different degree of malice was required—it must express malice, he said.

"Of course, there is back of this intent," said Judge Anderson. "The owner of a newspaper might well be held civilly for anything that appeared in his pages, because the men who put it there are his agents, but when it comes to a question of criminal liability for publication of an article, it is different."

"As for example, if the proprietor of a newspaper in New York (I could not cite this illustration for a western paper, for because rich as they are, they are not rich enough to own their own yachts)—but suppose the proprietor of a New York paper should be off for six months cruising in his yacht. In his absence a vicious article appeared in his paper. Should he be held criminally? It does not occur to me that he could be held criminally liable."

"I am speaking about the ultimate facts. If the owner is not present he actually knew nothing about the publication and could not possibly be held guilty of the crime."

Questioning Charles R. Williams, editor of the News, Asst. United States Dist. Atty. McManis drew out that Mr. Williams had not written the editorials complained of, in which it was declared to be desirable that the part of C. P. Taft, Douglas Robinson, William Nelson Cromwell and J. Pierpont Morgan in the Panama transfer should be investigated. He had, however, approved them. Mr. Williams said the publication of the editorials, he thought, was in the interest of public morality and integrity.

Louis Howland, who wrote the editorials and handed them to Mr. Williams, told the court that he wrote them because he thought the subject was "the biggest thing in the world." He had made no personal investigation into the records of the senate inquiry and he did not know personally that C. P. Taft was a newspaper in the Panama transfer. A newspaper did not have the time to make such investigations, he said.

Deavan Smith testified that he had no personal knowledge of the editorials before they were published, as Mr. Williams had full charge of the editorial page.

Ernest L. Lewis, a staff correspondent of the News, declared he had no instructions from his paper as to how he should handle the Panama canal matter in his dispatches.

SHERIFF SHIPP CONTEMPT CASE POSTPONED

Washington, June 1.—In the cases of former Sheriff Shipp and others of Chattanooga, charged with contempt of the supreme court of the United States, the court today postponed the passing of sentence to June 10, on account of the illness of the prisoners. The cases therefore go over until next term, the prisoners remaining out on bond.

The arraignment of six men before the bar of the highest court of the nation was a scene unprecedented in the annals of that tribunal. The prisoners consist of former Sheriff Joseph F. Shipp of Hamilton county, Tenn.; and his father, Jeremiah Gibson, and Luther Williams, Nick Nolan, Henry Padgett and William Mayes, all of Chattanooga.

They were found guilty a week ago by the court on the charge of permitting and participating in the lynching in 1905 of Ed Johnson, a negro condemned to hang for conviction for rape. The supreme court had granted Johnson permission to bring his case before the court on appeal. This, of course, caused the postponement of the execution and the feeling in Chattanooga culminated the night following in the hanging by a mob.

GOULD DIVORCE CASE. He Complained Because Wife Rode With Khedive's Brother.

New York, June 1.—That Howard Gould made complaint when his wife rode with Prince Mohamed Ali, brother of the khedive of Egypt, in Cairo in 1902, was one of the declarations in a deposition filed today by Mrs. Gould's separation. The deposition was made by Mrs. Alice S. Bankhead, of Fort McPherson, Ga., who was formerly a ward of Gen. John G. Long, then the American consul at Cairo, and her deposition Mrs. Bankhead said that Gen. Long had arranged for Mr. and Mrs. Gould to visit the khedive's palace, and that Mrs. Gould drove with the prince at the prince's request. Mr. Gould, Mrs. Bankhead said, complained about this.

NEW COUNTERFEIT OF \$5 SILVER CERTIFICATE. Washington, June 2.—A new counterfeit \$5 silver certificate has come to the attention of the secret service bureau. It is of the series of 1899 (Indian head) and is a photo-mechanical production printed on bond paper of good quality, blue ink lines having been used to imitate the silk fibre of the genuine.

According to Acting Chief Moran of the bureau, the poor character of workmanship on the Indian head should be the means of detecting the counterfeit. The workmanship of the blue seal, numbers and large numerals are far from being inferior, the back of the note being especially deceptive.

FIRST DAY AT SEATTLE FAIR. Seattle, Wash., June 2.—The first day's attendance at the exposition, according to figures given out by the management, was 89,286. The greater part of this was in the day time, more than 75,000 people passing through the turnstiles between 10 o'clock and 4 o'clock. The night attendance was cut down by a severe rainstorm.

GREEKS FOR MIDDLE WEST. New York, June 2.—More than 1,000 Greeks arrived here today on the steamship Patri, en route to cities in the middle west, where they are to be employed in the construction of a canal. A booking agency said that a majority of the Greek immigrants intend to start small candy shops or to operate concessions at pleasure parks in the middle west. Never before have so many Greeks arrived on the same vessel.

CANNIBALISM. Dr. Gowland Hopkins Justifies It Scientifically.

Chicago, June 2.—A London special cable to the Tribune says: Scientific justification of cannibalism was propounded by Prof. Dr. Gowland Hopkins in an address at the Royal Institution.

"What would be the most efficient protein for men?" He asked. "Clearly, although not a point of practical dietetics, he answered himself, 'the most sensible person in this campaign is the cannibal. In consuming his own kind he is eating the right stuff, though it may seem greivous.'"

"The experiment of a worker in Heidelberg university just lately proved this point. It found that a dog, when fed with dog, was able to do with a much smaller quantity of protein than when fed with any other protein."

"Whatever there is in the chemistry of species the nearer the two species of animals are together, the more nearly does the chemistry of their bodies agree."

ROCKEFELLER TO HAVE TEMPLE. New York, June 2.—An important construction company has announced last night that it had undertaken the construction of a fountain, arbor, and temple on the estate of John D. Rockefeller at Pocantico Hills and adjoining the new \$250,000 castle. A member of the construction company said that it was his understanding that the temple was to be used as a private chapel for the members of the Rockefeller family.
