The early spring weather is apparently having its effect already in the cyanide shipments which find their way from this and adjoining States to the sampling rooms of the Con. WEEK ON WALL STREET.

New York, April 7.--Both the stock and bond markets have continued ac-tive and broad during the week. Profit taking has not been on a very large scale and has led to reaction during the latter part of the week. Best prices have not been maintained and any net losses have resulted. Outside this technical cause of weakness, con-ditions bearing on values have continued favorable. Money has worked easier, in spite of active demand from the stock market. Railroad earnings are beyond all precedent, the blum-inous coal carrying roads showing re-markable increases. The grain markets reflect the expectation of a good foreign demand and good crops to meet it. The undertone of strength in the stock market has therefore in spite of the large profit-taking.
