LOCAL BRIEFS.

Supt. Nelson Returns—State Supt. A. C. Nelson has returned from Miami where he attended the local celebration that was held through the three first days of the week.

Application For Water—F. B. Jones and R. H. Young filed application Wednesday afternoon with the state engineer for 10 second feet of water from Trout creek in Utah county, for power to be used in the Clifton mining district.

Eclipse of Moon—There will be a total eclipse of the moon Saturday midnight, continuing two hours. Halley's comet is now visible at 5 a. m. to the northeast, and is becoming plainer each day as it draws nearer the earth.

No Smallpox in Colton—H. M. Black, president of the Utah Mineral Wax company at Colton, reports that while there may be smallpox in surrounding districts, there is really none in Colton; the report that Colton was affected being due no doubt to errors in health reports.

The decorations were elaborate, and punch was served during the evening by young ladies, while the Hawaiian Travelers furnished vocal music both in English and Hawaiian. The dancing and other music was excellent, and the entire evening was much enjoyed.

NEW FLOORING MILL PLANNED

Idaho Man Prepared to Build
Roller Mill With 1,000-
Barrel Capacity.

EMPLOY ONE HUNDRED MEN

Enterprise Will Cost \$75,000 and Add
3,000 to 4,000 Cars to
City's Shipping.

Salt Lake is to have a fine new flooring mill to cost \$75,000 with a capacity of 1,000 barrels a day, if the plans at present nearing completion are carried out. It will have a department for rolling oil, will employ over 100 men, and will add from 3,000 to 4,000 cars to the total annual shipping of the city.

Albert G. Robert, of Blackfoot, Ida., who recently disposed of his interest in the Blackfoot Mill and Elevator company, is the man behind the plans. He has been in the city for some time looking over the ground and discussing the project with the business men of the city. He has been so favorably impressed with the plan that he has given assurance of such strong support that it is now up to one of three real estate firms to furnish him a site.

It is intended to start work upon the building, which is to be of brick and with all modern improvements and machinery, early in the spring. Within six months Mr. Robert expects to have the plant running, and thinks that there is no doubt that he will be able to handle the wheat crop of Utah and Idaho. The oats will also come to the mill for conversion into breakfast foods and other eaten products.

The erection of this mill will add another and very important industry to the city and will do much toward increasing the acreage in wheat and oats in the contiguous country.
