Major Gen. Elwell S. Otis will be deiched from duty as governor general t the Philippines and commander of the department of the Pacific immeditely after the arrival of the new Philpine commission, and will be ordered o return to the United States,

#### Also Hopes that the British Will Not Reach Ladysmith.

New York, Feb. 7.-Mr. Bryan spoke tonght in Carnegie Music hall on "Pending Problems" under the aus-pless of Winfield Scott Hancock post A.R. for the relief of soldiers and idows and orphans.

Mr. Bryan in the course of his speech spoke of the strife of the Civil war and restored harmony between the th and South. Then speaking of orth and South. e men who served in the Spanish war e said:

l claim no credit for myself for what did as a soldier. I would rather not be called by my military title, and when I recall the Civil war I feel shamed to be taken for a soldier. All did was to express a willingness, and hat was done on the day war was delared, and my resignation was signed the day peace was announced.'

Continuing, Mr. Bryan took up one by one the political questions of the "I have been asked why I don't drop the silver question and take up the trusts entirely. Because they are the same thing. I am not going to drop the money trust and attack the soap or the match trust. I am not go-ing to drop the bear in order to chase the cub. You will find that the men who stand behind the money trust are the same as the men who are behind the international trust.

"Over in South Africa," said Mr. Bryan, "England (hisses) started what she thought was going to be a little war, and yet her soldiers have not yet reached Lad, smith and God grant they never will."
