Commercial Club Committee on Railways and Transportation Held Interesting Session.

UTAH DISCRIMINATED ACAINST

Latest Move by Harriman Lines Still Another Blow to the Local Jobbing Interests.

- The Commercial club committee on railways and transportation held an interesting session yesterday afternoon to consider the announcement of the O. R. & N. of reduction in freight rates from Portland to Idaho points. The committee agreed that this would mean the loss of southern Idaho to the Salt Lake jobbers, but just what remedy can be applied will have to be determined on | later by a meeting of the jobbers themselves. Manager Fisher Harris of the club made the following statement to the committee:

"We are combating the same old trouble. There hasn't been a day since the Commercial club was organized three years ago that the committee on railways and transportation has not been busily engaged in trying to Dravent the railroads from transforming Sait Lake into a whistling station. By their discriminations in freight rates they have made it impossible to start

they have made it impossible to start any new industries here, and those we have are having a hard fight to exist. "Sait Lake jobbers are being barred out of territory that naturally belongs to them, and in order to do business in their natural tributary territory they have been compelled to establish beauch houses at points in Maho and branch houses at points in Idaho and other states. A special committee was appointed a year ago to get a revision of the Idaho tariffs that would be more of the idaho tariffs that would be more favorable to Sait Lake than those in use, and which are discriminatory against Salt Lake, but nothing came of it. In the face of the fact that freight is hauled through Sait Lake to.
