Miss Edith Sutherland, daughter of George Sutherland, was successfully operated upon yesterday, for appendicitis by Dr. T. B. Hoarty, at St. Mark's hospital.

The three live swans recently captured on Red Rock lake in Montana, are now being exhibited in the East Temple street windows of the Western Arms company.

County Auditor Fisher requests all of the registrars and judges of the recent election to call at his office and present their claims for services and they be attended to.

The Salt Lake County Horticultural society will meet on Saturday next at 1 p. m. in the City and County building. Those interested in fruit or garden plants will be glad to attend.

Vice President W. H. Bancroft's private car 1904, was brought back to San Francisco yesterday and is to be sent east for the temporary accommodation of the New York directors.

The remains of Daniel H. Green who recently died in this city of typhoid fever, have been shipped to Clear Lake, Iowa, his former home, for interment. The young man's father came on to return with the body.

F. C. Hedrick of 545 east Sixth South street, a painter, fell from a ladder yesterday afternoon, while at work, and striking on his head was rendered unconscious. He was taken home where he lies in a critical condition.

Rector Franklin S. Spalding of St. Paul's church at Erie, Pa., has resigned to become bishop of Salt Lake, and will be consecrated at Erie Dec. 21 next, St. Thomas' day. The new bishop will leave for this city early in January.

The Salt Lake Route has inaugurated a theater special from Utah county points to Salt Lake which stops at all points and returns after the show. The first was run last night when 300 people were brought in to hear Sousa. This innovation is likely to become a popular institution.

Articles of incorporation of the Salt Lake Cab and Transfer company have been filed in the county clerk's office. It has a capital stock of \$10,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. D. C. Roberts is president; H. O. Martin, vice president; J. E. Shields, secretary and treasurer.

President Beatty of the Salt Lake Charities association has appointed E. H. Wood, W. Mont Perry, W. H. Tibbals, Joseph Georgehan and Dr. F. A. Druehl to become directors of the association. Articles of incorporation will be filed this week.

J. H. Hardy of 517 Eighth East street, declares it understood that he is not the man who was on Wednesday arrested for being drunk. Especially emphatic is he in the statement that he has no connection with the "American" party, whose money the individual arrested was spending lavishly.

William Sandall, who lives on State street near Murray, took on a cargo of fire-water last night and went to his home and drove his entire family from the house. Sheriff Sherry was notified and he sent Deputy Sheriff Cowan down after Sandall. The latter is now occupying a cell in the county jail.

Frank D. Halm, formerly for some years with the Salt Lake Hardware company, is now the co-owner of the Mark Manufacturing company of Chicago, with headquarters at San Francisco. Mr. Halm's family will remain in Salt Lake during the winter. He is now in town on a visit to them.

County Attorney Whitaker has issued a complaint against P. Murran, charging him with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to do bodily harm. It is alleged that Murran made a gun play at William H. Novak and shot Joseph Kerola. The man was not seriously injured. The complaint will be filed in Justice Lee's court at Bingham.

The Salt Lake Produce Exchange has arranged with Manager Harris of the Commercial club to hold a luncheon there every Wednesday afternoon, at which time members will discuss local business situations concerning their special lines. As this date has been the day for the Real Estate association to meet and eat, it will be changed to some other convenient day and hour.

In the case of T. F. Earnshaw against E. Maxfield et al, doing business as the Maxfield Vinegar company, the jury yesterday afternoon returned a verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$171. The suit, which was tried in Judge Stewart's court, was brought to recover the above amount on some vinegar sold by plaintiff to defendants. The case was first tried in the civil division of the city court where a judgment was rendered in favor of plaintiff for \$168. An appeal to the district court was taken by defendants.

Street Supervisor Seddon this morning put a force of men at work on the street, cutting down the grade so that it will conform with the established grade of the street and the sidewalks. As fast as possible the streets where the new sidewalks have been laid will be brought down to the established grade and thus the objectionable condition of certain corners will be remedied. After that work is completed the residents will be able to see what an advantage the new grades will be to the city, and it is probable that all complaints will be withdrawn.
