

WASHINGTON NOTES.

From the Washington Star, Dec. 20—

Special Indian Agent Major Thompson, who was dispatched by the government to investigate the cause of the Indian troubles between the Sioux and Utes in the Snake River Valley, ascertained that whiskey was at the bottom of the affair, and caused the dispensers of that article to the Indians to be placed under arrest, and warrants issued for the arrest of those not at hand. A messenger was dispatched to invite the Indians to return to the reservation. This will probably end the trouble.

The Senate sub-committee on Post Offices and Post Roads have been at work on the subject of postal deficiencies, and the cause thereof, and as a matter of interest in connection therewith the following figures are given: States which report an excess of receipts over expenditures:—New Hampshire, \$41,439.49; Massachusetts, \$616,778.74; Rhode Island, \$111,865.79; Connecticut, \$189,811.33; New York, \$1,121,468.93; New Jersey, \$47,573.05; Pennsylvania, \$431,620.62. All the rest of the States show that their expenditures are in excess of their receipts. Texas and California show the largest deficiencies, they being as follows:—Texas, \$524,854.01; California, \$504,178.70. Next come on the losing side, Missouri, Utah, New Mexico, Illinois, Nebraska, Ohio, Kansas and Minnesota, all of which run over \$250,000, and most of them \$300,000. The District shows a deficiency of \$76,039.62. Total deficiencies, \$7,306,845.59. Total in excess, \$2,560,557.90. From the exhibit it will be seen that in the New England States, where there is a dense population the postal service more than pays for itself; whereas in the other States, most of which are sparsely settled, the Post Office department is minus.

THREE KINGS.—America, or a considerable portion of the United States part of it, has been exercised to a degree of late over three kings, and this is how the Indianapolis Journal puts the situation—

"Just now there are three Kings before the country, namely: King Kalakaua, Katie King, and Col. Wm. King. The first is an honest, sensible man, who asks no particular favors of anybody. The second is a buxom young woman with a soft arm, a round waist, and a warm hand, whom Robert Dale Owen mistook for a spirit. The third was Postmaster of the Forty-second Congress, and handled several hundred thousand dollars of the Pacific Mail corruption fund. He is the one the public is now anxious to hear from."

PUBLIC DEBT AND THE "CONSIDERATION."—This is how the New York Herald speaks of the municipal debt of that city—

"New York has incurred fifty million dollars of debt in three years and has nothing to show for it except overpaid departments swarming with political vermin, vexatious and costly litigation, financial muddle and confusion, dilapidated streets, neglected public works, stagnation and general dry rot."

REVOLUTION OR MILITARY GOVERNMENT.—The New York Graphic is represented as reasserting its convictions uttered months ago, that the situation in Louisiana will eventually lead to revolution, and the only way out of the difficulty is through the establishment of a military government.
