Both companies will then have equal rights at Helena and Butte City, and will make the same through rates from these points.

Narrow Escape.—The Logan Leader says, that another gun accident occurred in Hyrum (Cache Co.) canon, last week: "Ellington Smith was carrying his rifle over his shoulder. The hand steadying the gun becoming cold, he attempted to change the position of his gun, when by some means he missed his hold. The gun fell behind him, and when it struck the ground it went off. The muzzle was close to his legs, but fortunately in a slanting position. The ball tore his pants, boot leg and sock, and inflicted a very slight flesh wound, in the language of Mr. J. W. Mann."

The Counterfeit Factory.—We heard a report this morning to the effect that there was a suspicion lately in the neighborhood of West Jordan that something wrong was going on in the vicinity of one of the neglected and neglected places. Some men had been noticed frequently in a dug-out, returning after more or less protracted absences. A number of citizens lately entered the "hole in the embankment" and found two men, who endeavored to evade recognition. There were also a quantity of tallow and some of the bogus dollars that have been lately in circulation. It is thought to be a certainty that this is the place where the counterfeiters were manufacturing. THE PEOPLE'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

SALT LAKE CITY,
January 23d, 1882.

The People's Convention of Salt Lake City is hereby called to convene at the City Hall of Salt Lake City, on Wednesday, February 8th, 1882, at 7 o'clock p.m., to nominate candidates for the vote at the municipal election, on Monday, the 13th day of February, 1882. The Convention will consist of thirty-six delegates, allotted to the several municipal wards as follows: 1st Municipal Ward, comprising the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 8th, 9th and 10th Bishop's Wards, 7. 2nd Municipal Ward, comprising the 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 14th and 15th Bishop's Wards, 8. 3rd Municipal Ward, comprising the 16th, 17th and 19th Bishop's Wards, 8. 4th Municipal Ward, comprising the 18th, 20th and 21st Bishop's Wards, 5. 5th Municipal Ward, comprising the 11th, 12th and 13th Bishop's Wards, 5.

Primary meetings of registered voters of the People's party, for the election of delegates to the convention, will be held in the several municipal wards of this city, at the usual places of holding elections therein, on Monday, Feb. 6th, 1882, at 7 o'clock p.m. Delegates should receive credentials, properly authenticated by the chairman and secretary of the meeting electing them. Leading citizens in the several municipal wards are respectfully requested to take the initiative in bringing into effect these suggestions, relative to the primary meetings, that the voters may be properly notified of the time and place of holding the same, that the rights and liberties of the voters of the People's party may be fully protected, and that the delegates chosen to the Convention may be such as will best represent the interests of the people.

Reduced Rates to St. George.—In view of the large number of people in this more northern part of the Territory who desire to visit the Temple at St. George to officiate for their dead progenitors, and for other ceremonial purposes, the news that the U. C. R. R. Company have reduced the rates to parties going on that business, will be gratifying.

We learn from Mr. Cope, passenger and freight agent, that by calling upon him personally parties can be provided with coupon tickets that will secure them a passage to St. George, and return for \$25, arrangements having been made with the stage companies by which this can be done. Those wishing to take advantage of this reduction in fares should arrange with Mr. Cope, as only a limited number can go on one day, the stage companies not desiring to put more than the present number of coaches on the road. The journey to St. George will occupy a little over 48 hours. For instance, those leaving on Monday afternoon would reach the end of their journey on Wednesday evening.

From Milford to Silver Reef passengers are conveyed by Gilmer & Salsbury's stage line and from Silver Reef to St. George by Lund and Judd's coaches.

Injured by Explosion.—An explosion occurred at Grass Creek, near Coalville, Utah, a few days ago. The blacksmith shop of the U. P. R. R. Company's coal mine was blown up with blasting powder, and Mr. Roberts, the blacksmith, and his helper were both severely, though not fatally, injured. The explosion was caused by the carelessness of some person who had stolen a can of gunpowder and recrated it, unknown to the blacksmith, underneath the forge. The shop was badly shattered, and in addition to Mr. Roberts and his helper, injuries were received by those employed in the shop. A person who was just entering the building was struck in the head by a fragment of the debris and seriously injured.

Murder at Blake City.—By Dr. Reid of Castle Dale, Emery County, we are informed of the killing on the 21st inst., of William Nugent, known as "California Bill," by William Duffy. The tragedy occurred at Blake City. The two had quarreled during the day, Duffy getting the worse of the fight. He subsequently procured a Winchester rifle with which he shot Nugent through the body, killing him. Nugent wounded Duffy in the calf of the leg, with a pistol shot. The affair raised quite an excitement, and threats of lynching Duffy were freely indulged in. This is the second homicide in Emery County within a very brief period, D. B. Blizzard being the previous victim.

The Boston Herald calls attention to the necessity of civil service reform, which is called for as loudly by the popular voice, as the suppression of "Mormon" marriage. But says that Utah is a long way off, and it is easy to pitch into the "Mormons" while Congress itself is interested in the spoils system, which demands such a complete overhauling. And the Herald looks at the matter correctly.

A man recently bought an unlimited ticket from New York to Galveston, Texas, for \$68.50, which was \$14 more than the price of a limited ticket. He procured a ten days' stop-over check at Three Rivers, Michigan, where he remained more than ten days. When he got on the train, the conductor refused him passage on his ticket, and put him off the train. A suit resulted, and the jury awarded the passenger \$253.80 damages.

The New York Herald publishes an account of the condition of a poor widow who sustains herself and family by making shawls for forty-five cents a dozen. Twenty-three cents a day is the amount they can earn when in full work. This is only a sample case, in one of the great Christian cities of the land. The widow lives four miles from the place where she gets her work, and to which she has to send it home. Do not the cries of the suffering, oppressed...
