Indian Massacre.

From the following account, published in the Santa Fe Gazette, of October 16th, it will be seen that another Indian massacre has taken place on the borders of our State:—[Sac. Union, Nov. 13.]

This evening, after we had gone to press, an express arrived in this city with very late and important news from the emigrant route to California. The letter is dated on the 22d of September, eighty miles west of the San Francisco Mountains.

The emigrant company, by the principal persons of which the letter is signed, had arrived in safety at the crossing of the Rio Colorado, near the Mohave villages. Shortly afterwards, they were attacked by 300 Mohave Indians, while most of the white men were engaged in constructing rafts to cross and in herding their stock, when a bloody fight ensued. In this engagement the emigrants lost three men, two women and four children, killed, and sixteen wounded. The Indians took all the stock except nineteen head of cattle and eleven horses. The emigrants then retreated on the return route in the night, taking with them but two wagons, wherein to haul a small supply of provisions, and bedding for the women and children. The whole party, at the date of the letter, consisted of 123 men, 33 women, old and young, and 47 children, from the two weeks old babe up. Soon after the retreat, starvation already staring them in the face, they fortunately met another emigrant party, who generously shared with them their provisions and comforts. This party, out of five hundred head of stock, had but one hundred and forty-five left, and they were in a most miserable condition.

The signers of the letter we alluded to are the following twenty persons, who implore assistance, not for themselves, but for their wives and children, whose sufferings are described in the most intense, to wit:

In response to this appeal, Major E. Backus, in command at Albuquerque, has sent forward, under escort, an ample supply of provisions to last them into the settlements.

This party were part of a larger company from Van Buren county, Iowa, for California. In New Mexico the party divided, one party coming the Beale and the other the Butterfield route. Those by the latter route have been in San Bernardino some weeks.

Died:

At his residence in Emigration Canyon, G.S.L. County, November 10, 1858, Elder JOHN KILLIAN, aged 62 years, 6 months and 15 days.

Elder Killian, son of Phillip and Mary, was born in Lincoln County, North Carolina, April 25, 1796; married Mrs. Lydia Conly, whose maiden name was Hopper, about 1817; was baptized and confirmed a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints by Oliver Cowdery, in La Fayette County, Mo., September, 1831; he was ordained an Elder in Jackson County, Mo.; in the Missouri persecutions, was driven from Jackson to Clay County, from Clay to Davis, from Davis to Caldwell, and from Caldwell to beyond the borders of the State; commanded a company in the defence of Far West, Mo., against the mob, in the Fall of 1838; went on a mission to Kentucky, Jan. 28, 1843, and took charge of the Branches in that State; followed the fortunes of the Saints in their being driven from Nauvoo, and arrived here among the early settlers of this Territory.

Elder Killian was a member of the High Priest's Quorum, and lived and died a good man, in the faith, practice and enjoyment of his religion.
