The health of the people in this settlement is good, no epidemic is heard of only that all-prevalent disease, the lack of money, although we have no reason to complain for, our fruit has turned out far exceeding the expectations of many, and have supplied a sufficiency of the necessities of life for the winter. Our crops have been average, but the potatoes have got pretty much frozen with the early frost before they were all taken out of the ground.

A few weeks since the Bishop presented to the Y. L. R. A. and Y. M. L. A. of this ward a plan whereby the meeting-house and the poor of the ward could be supplied with wood for the winter. The plan has been carried out by the young men, who turned out with teams and went into the cañons and hauled a sufficiency both for the meeting-house and to supply the poor.

The young ladies got up a nice picnic party for the young men who did the hauling, which came off on the evening of the 12th inst., when all that took part therein felt to enjoy themselves both in the dance and also in the picnic, the musicians rendering their services free.

The weather is extremely cold and has been so for the past two days.

Sally Kanosh died at 10 o'clock a.m., yesterday, December 9th, at the house recently put up at the Indian Farm, and was buried today in the temple clothes presented to her by the late President Brigham Young. The body was taken charge of by the ever-ready, in works of charity, Adelia Kimball, and her efficient help of the Relief Society. Quite a number of brethren turned out with teams to conduct the funeral and convey the Indian to our burying ground, where she was interred. Addresses were delivered by Brothers Christensen, Abraham and Reay. A solemn and peaceful influence prevailed. The faithful old chief, Kanosh, was deeply moved at the respect shown to his dead wife, and expressed his confidence in the good effect it would produce upon his people, as contrasting a kind and Christian burial with the rude manner of disposing of the Indian dead. Sally, for several days, was aware of the near approach of death, and instructed Kanosh as to the disposal of her clothes, etc.
