GENERAL GRANT.

His Triumphant Trip to the East.

OMAHA, 3.—A banquet was tendered General Grant last evening by the citizens. About sixty invited guests were present. After dinner speeches were made by the General and Senators Saunders and Padlock. The General was quite witty. His tongue seems to have become loosened in Nebraska, and he made speeches at every stopping place after striking the border line. An hour's reception was held and then General Grant and wife with Mr. and Mrs. Crook drove to military headquarters at Fort Omaha, where they remained all night. The weather has been unfavorable, dusty and cold.

Council Bluffs, 3.—A special train carrying General Grant and party left here for Burlington, Iowa, at 9:30 this morning, via Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad.

OAK, Iowa, 3.—The special train which backed into Omaha was received by a large crowd at Council Bluffs. Thirty-nine members of the Grand Army of the Republic welcomed General Grant and Governor Geary made a speech of welcome, and offered an escort of the Grand Army across Iowa, which Grant accepted with the remark: "There was a time when their protection was more necessary than now. I hope this occasion may prove more pleasant one than I have needed your escort before. I thank you Governor, and the State of Iowa heartily for your good will and your escort."

Creation, 3.—At Villaca General Grant, through a severe band of shingles in a good natured way. The run from Villaca to Creation, forty-five miles, was made in forty minutes. A large army was erected on a main track here, and a large crowd was in waiting.

The Stubborn Witness.

New York, 3.—The examination of Jas. E. Colgate was continued today before United States Commissioner Lyman in the suit of the government against Samuel J. Tilden. Colgate is a witness in the case, and he was examined as to his books, and he was excused as a witness. The judge directed the examination to be closed before a commissioner, and to this ruling the United States attorney excepted on the ground that the court had no power either to excuse a witness or to close the case.

Panama advises say: Paraffin, the oleomargarine swindler, who went from San Francisco to Santiago and organized mining there, was arrested and imprisoned two years ago, and was sentenced to five years' exile in Villavieja under guard. The Paraffin fraud in Santiago entailed the loss of many thousands of dollars upon several of the most reliable members of the community who for some time solemnly believed in the humbug. Works valued at hundreds of thousands of dollars were erected at Santiago for the reduction of ore, according to the Paraffin method, which remained to this day a monument of his fraud.

Financial, Political, etc. The Evening Post says: We understand that the Union National Bank, one of the banks which has many stock brokers for customers, has decided to go out of the national system, and several other banks have the subject under consideration. The recent action of the controller of currency respecting check certificates in the assigned case of the Chicago and North Western, General Grosvonts and Colonel F. C. Campbell, of Ohio, arrived here from the interior of the State, where they have been receiving efficient service in the republican campaign. The eve of the political battle finds the supporters of Cornell and Robinson equally confident.

The steamship Rhein brought \$950,000 and the Britannia \$850,000 in British gold bars and American gold coin.

A Halifax dispatch says: The storm which visited the eastern part of the province last week destroyed Prince Edward Island \$50,000.

No Homicide. The Herald has the following paragraph: A vigorous attempt to introduce the favorite hoodlum pastime in New York has been completely discouraged by the bench. For merely assisting at dragging a Chinaman through the streets by a larrikin tightened against the Chinaman's neck, a young man has been sentenced to the workhouse for a month, and they call this a free country.

Thanksgiving.

WASHINGTON, 3.—The following proclamation was issued by the President to-day:

A PROCLAMATION.

which the wisdom and courage of the nation fully command, and the wisdom and courage of their descendants have so firmly maintained to be the habitation of liberty and justice to successive generations.

Now, therefore, I, Rutherford B. Hayes, President of the United States, do appoint Thursday, the 27th of November, a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, and I earnestly recommend that, withdrawing themselves from secular cares and labors, the people of the United States do meet together on that day in their respective places of worship, there to give thanks and praise to Almighty God for His mercies, and to devoutly beseech their continuance.

Army Statistics. Gen. Sherman's annual report to the Secretary of War was completed to-day. It is prefaced with the usual laudatory statements and returns compiled by the Adjutant General, commenting upon which Gen. Sherman says: The 11 general officers, 20,556 men and 33 Indian scouts, together with other officers of staff as are assigned by the War Department to duty with the troops, constitute the army proper, or the combative force. All other parts of the military establishment are provided by law for special service, more or less connected with the army or militia, but not available for frontier defense. Thus, for instance, the 377 enlisted men of the Ordnance are in fact workmen at the arsenal; the 192 men of the engineer corps are at Willits Point, undergoing instructions in torpedo practice, and are not subject to the division commander; the 45 of the Signal Corps are employed in observing the weather or in working the telegraph; the 114 ordnance sergeants are charged with the care of the magazines, etc. These various detachments, aggregating 3,463 enlisted men, of the highest grades, compose about one-sixth part of the military establishment.

DETROIT, 3.—James L. Pritch, who recently murdered his wife and four-year-old daughter, at Hadley, has been convicted and sentenced to solitary confinement and hard labor for life, at the Jackson Penitentiary.

A MANDAMUS REQUEST.

BOSTON, 3.—The Journal says: Walter Hastings, recently deceased, left the bulk of his fortune to Harvard College, and by 500 testaments his wife. It is estimated that it amounts to \$100,000.

Memphis Freezing Up.

MEMPHIS, 3.—Ice formed this morning in all the gutters of the city, and to-day, is far the coldest of the season.

SAN FRANCISCO, 3.—John Donnell, a blacksmith, was shot dead yesterday by Daniel Harrigan, a special officer. Both were in liquor and quarrelling.

Fatally Burned.
