

# PROGRAM OF REFORMS IN CHINA

## Most Important Proposition Is Establishment of Constitution At End of Nine Years.

### LAST DAYS OF THE EMPEROR

Various Foreign Legations Have Abandoned Poincaré Theory as to Him and Dowager-Empress.

Peekin, Nov. 19.—An edict ordering posthumous honors for the late dowager-empress was issued today and it enumerates a fourth time since the death of his majesty, the program of reform to which the new regime is committed. These political edicts first began appearing four days ago when, in the name of the emperor and the grand council, two decrees entailing upon the infant emperor, Pu Yi, the carrying out of the reforms already inaugurated by his predecessor were published. One of these, after specifying a number of the reforms in question, says:

**THE EDICTS.**  
"We have received reverently the decree of the dowager-empress appointing Pu Yi to be emperor. As this prince shows promise of being intelligent and he can count upon the care and support of the dowager-empress and through his devotion to affairs of state, he may bring tranquility to the empire. Officials must purify their hearts, abandon all animosities and heartily obey previous edicts."  
"With regard to the existing program, years of study have been given to its preparation. Its purpose is to establish a constitution for China at the end of nine years and by completing what is left unfinished you will comfort your spirit in heaven."

myriad of affairs and my strength and my heart are exhausted. Since last summer I have been ill and not able to assist in the multitudinous affairs of the government with tranquility. For long I have been without appetite, nor have I been able to sleep. On Nov. 14 came the death of the emperor, and it was then impossible for me to exercise self control. Following this day my illness increased until now I am able to rise from my couch.

I took back today over 50 years of sorrow and trouble and even at the end of my life my faculties still are with me and I can find no appetite. "Reform in the method of government has begun and these ideas will be continued," he hoped. The emperor and all his officials should exert themselves to strengthen the foundations of the empire. Let the emperor, Pu Yi, make the affairs of the empire of first importance and to this end let him be adequately instructed.

These edicts, taken together, are considered to commit the new regime conclusively to a program of reform and progress.

Prince Chung was present at the palace both yesterday and today. The Forbidden City is crowded all day long with officials of various degrees and throngs of mourners, and notable in the gathering of the dailal lama, of Tibet and all his disciples. Tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock there will be a service of Tibetan prayers before the coffin of the late majesties. The Tibetans will officiate.

### EMPEROR'S LAST DAY.

Accurate information concerning the last days of the emperor and the dowager-empress was obtained today from officials of the palace. The various foreign legations in attempting to determine the causes of the death of the emperor and the dowager-empress have abandoned the poison theory and have concluded that the symptoms of the emperor indicate that death resulted from neurasthenia and cardiac weakness, together with ear complications.

The foreign board denies emphatically and without qualification the rumors that either of their majesties was poisoned. The emperor made a speech less than one hour before his death. He passed away during a period of the greatest excitement and confusion. His last days were spent in a temporary disquiet under the impression that there was no change in the condition of his majesty and that he might live for some time. The last illness of the dowager-empress dated from Nov. 1. On this day the emperor was terrified by an outbreak of uncontrolled temper from her majesty. On the 12th of November, she suffered a paralytic stroke which rendered her unable to move. On Nov. 13 Prince Chun returned from her mansion in the eastern hills, whither she had sent him to make a religious offering in her behalf. He found her in a state of collapse and he propped up the body of his mother to follow him out to the hills. An official of high standing said today that the empress had died of apoplexy, and that she was able to talk and did talk up to within a few hours of her death.

### DOWAGER-EMPRESS'S SUFFERINGS.

The members of the grand council, in a testamentary statement written expressly for her majesty, have drawn out a picture of her last sufferings. This account reveals the awe-stricken condition of the court. Soon after the death were announced hundreds of men, including everybody attached to the household departments, collected in the palace and remained there for five days.

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On the night of Nov. 16, the dowager-empress called the members of the grand council together and talked with them for some time. She was lying prone, but fully dressed. After one hour's consultation the councilors were dismissed, but they were told to return at 2 o'clock in the morning to attend the edict to the throne. It is reported that her majesty was able to signify her assent to these particular edicts, but immediately after having done this she died.

The emperor and the dowager-empress were dead or moribund when the regency edicts were actually known throughout the palace that their majesties were dead a condition of panic ensued. The widow of Tung Chi attempted to commit suicide because she perceived she would be buried with her husband. There was an outbreak of weeping and general pandemonium. Many of the palace eunuchs fled, carrying with them such valuables as they could lay their hands on. The few eunuchs who remained were given a quantity of food and were ordered to remain in the palace.

Today the emperor has been reinstated and except for the continuance of funeral obsequies and observances, conditions of the palace are normal. The principal consultations of the late Kuang Hsu have been resumed.

Pu Yi, the baby emperor, has been taken from his family and cared for within the palace precincts. He is popularly reported as crying day and night for his old nurse.

# DR. NICHOLAS M. BUTLER ON NATIONAL PROBLEMS

Kansas City, Nov. 19.—Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of the Columbia university, speaking here tonight at the annual dinner of the Kansas City Commercial club, declared that the great questions of banking and currency and of the regulation of the transportation systems of the country and of trust were not properly a matter for partisan exploitation or for party differences. These questions, he said, could not be solved by rhetoric or in passion, but only by intelligent, so-

lert study and reflection. "It is the first duty of the patriot and intelligent business interests of the country," said Dr. Butler, "now that there is an interval between political canvasses and campaign to apply themselves with all the power of their great influence to the task of settling the questions in which politics and business border so closely upon each other in ways that will conduce to the moral and material upbuilding of our people as well as their happiness and prosperity."

Dr. Butler and Senator Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana were the guests of honor at the annual dinner of the club held in commemoration of the signing of the John Jay commercial treaty. The dinner was held at the Baltimore hotel. Plates were laid for 400 guests.

**ARKANSAS FOREST FIRES.**  
Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 20.—Dispatches received here indicate no abatement of the forest fires which have been burning in this state for some days. Already a great amount of property has been destroyed. A Men, Ark., dispatch says that 15 miles of solid fire is sweeping through the Kiawah mountains in eastern Oklahoma and threaten to destroy the Arkansas

national forest reserves. Steps have been taken by government officials to check the progress of the fire.
